Your Association has notified the W.A.N.F.L. that we will be only serving Country Leagues and Associations, which provide an adequate Workers Compensation cover this season. As far as I can ascertain, most Country Districts

bought this scheme into operation in 1971.

A number of incidents in one Country League saw your Association take swift and positive action, to the extent of threatening to withdraw Umpires from officiating at their matches. An eleventh hour guarantee of our requests being honoured, resulted in a remarkable transformation of relationships towards Umpires—something which I'm happy to say, continued for the remainder of the season.

A recommendation I would like to put to the incoming Committee, is an urgent need for a revision of Country Umpiring Fees for the 1973 season, especially in respect to the increases being applied in the outer Metropolitan

Leagues and Associations.

RESULTS OF MEETING BETWEEN W.A.N.F.L. BOARD OF MANAGEMENT AND OUR SENIOR EXECUTIVE REPRESENTED BY MR. RAY WHITFIELD AND MR. CLIVE HILLS:

- 1. **Provident Fund For Umpires:** The League are prepared to administer a self contributing Provident Fund. They will review equal contribution by both parties with the next revision of Umpires' Fees.
- Life Passes: League Life Passes are now available to all Umpires who have officiated in 150 or more League games retrospective of 1947.
 - 3. State Ties: Will be issued to all Umpires officiating in Interstate fixtures.
- 4. **Shelters For Reserve Umpires:** The League is looking into the provision of shelters for the Reserve Umpire.
- 5. **Pre-Season Training Camp:** The League will pay the rental for the National Fitness Camp.
- 6. Sub Committee for the Investigation of Umpire Problems: The possible formation of an Umpiring Sub Committee is under review.

CONCLUSION:

Thus another successful season has flown by. A year, which has certainly had its moments, but one may safely say that the support and co-operation extended to the Management Committee has allowed us to come through in front.

I feel this year again may have times when we will require the ful support of our members. Our Association must be strong, and the only way you can achieve this is by having **YOU**, **THE MEMBERS**, 100% behind our Management Committee. We are slowly gaining recognition in the outside world—a strong active Committee, with solid support from the Members, will ensure continued progress in this regard.

Again this year, may I appeal to all Members when voting time come later tonight, to vote for the candidates whom you feel will serve to lift th image of Umpires, and who will give their time and energy for the bes interest of the Association in the coming year.

EASTERN STATES TRIP

There were many who believed this trip was impossible when it w first suggested 18 months earlier, and its fulfilment was due entirely to t efforts of the 37 members who worked magnificently to raise over \$11,00 in that time.

A committee was formed in 1970 consisting of Lance Perkins who w Trip Manager, Dick Stubberfield Secretary-Treasurer, Ray Whitfield, Kevin Malee, Bob Anderson and John Fuhrmann who, unfortunately, was forced withdraw and was replaced by Ross Capes. The functions held to rai money are now history but who could ever forget the final function held Canterbury Court when 995 people filled the ballroom to capacity to see eig of the best night club acts available in Perth.

It was 6 a.m. precisely when the TAA jet arrived in Sydney but this did not deter a group of N.S.W. Umpires from being present at the airport to meet our party. After breakfast at the airport, a bus took the party to Bondi Travelodge and a free afternoon followed.

Friday night saw the N.S.W. Umpires provide an official welcoming dinner at Football House while Saturday afternoon was spent as guests of the A.J.C. at Royal Randwick. This day was momentous as it represented the start of the decline of Lindsay Johnston. After careful study of the actions of other members, he was seen to place the first wager of his life. Within a week he had spent sufficient to buy two poker machines of his own.

The sporting clubs of Sydney were only too ready to extend their hospitality to our members and our thanks go out to the Western Suburbs Rules Football Club, St. George's Leagues Club, where it cost a whole seventy five cents a jug to see Frank Sinatra Jnr. and South Sydney Juniors Leagues Club in particular.

Two tours of Sydney were arranged, one of the Opera House and city sights, while the second tour of northern beaches incorporating a launch cruise on Pitt Water was one of the highlights. Lindsay Johnston by now well established as the Fuehrer, again displayed hitherto unknown talents, this time as a seaman.

Thursday morning, October 14th, 37 members were rounded up and taken to Sydney airport where we boarded the plane to Melbourne. Many people broke down and wept when we left, but undoubtedly the most unhappy was the manager of the Bondi Rex Hotel who had established an all time record in can sales in the past week.

The V.F.L. Umpires turned out in force to meet us in Melbourne and, again, the wonderful spirit that exists between kindred bodies of umpires was demonstrated. Cars, drivers and invitations were in abundant supply.

Tours were made of the M.C.G. and Waverley Park, tickets were made available to the greyhound racing at Sandown Park and an official dinner held at the Masonic Club on the Friday night was memorable in more ways than one. The Caulfield Cup of 1971 was witnessed by those who had any money left at this stage.

Sunday morning, our baggage was collected by TAA from the luxurious motel, Leicester Court, at which we had been wonderfully looked after and most members made their way to an informal luncheon at Salzburg Lodge, a licensed restaurant situated about ten miles from Melbourne. Hospitality was again showered upon us and this afternoon was voted the best of the tour.

Eventually 26 members boarded the plane at Tullamarine Airport (the other 11 couldn't be persuaded to come back) and a magnificent tour was at an end.
