# SECRETARY'S REPORT

May I present for your consideration and information my Annual Report for 1975.

The highlight of the past season has undoubtedly been the co-operation and consideration extended to us by the W.A.N.F.L., through their General Manager and the Board of Directors. I believe these Gentlemen have done everything within their power to improve the image of umpiring in Western Australia. This undoubtedly has contributed to yet another successful season for our great Association.

In my last Annual Report, I made mention of the W.A.N.F.L. Directors seeking a meeting with our Senior Executive. It is history now how successful this meeting was, but I feel it's worthwhile mentioning some of the gains we achieved:-

(a) A dramatic rise in all umpiring fees

(b) Further increase in subsidy payment for trainers.

(c) Scratch Match Fees standardized and paid by the W.A.N.F.L.

(d) Supply of Dressing Gowns for use at all League Grounds.

- (e) Payment of Emergency Umpire of full match fee for whichever umpire he replaces, irrespective of the time involved.
- (f) Ladies Passes to all Umpires officiating in League and Reserve Matches.

Without a doubt, a very impressive number of gains. It must make some of our retired members shudder to think that things they sought year after year, all come to fruition at one meeting. How times change.

May I take the opportunity to record on behalf of all Members our sincere gratitude and appreciation to the W.A.N.F.L.; their General Manager, Mr. Peter Bowler and the Directors for the efforts for our Association in 1975.

From our own Association viewpoint, the year has had its ups and downs. Support by you, the members has generally been forthcoming, but as is the case too often, there are always those that fail to contribute. Functions are arranged for the members; variety has certainly been evident on our social calendar this year, but again there were many faces not present. As I stress each year in this report, the enjoyment and satisfaction which you obtain from your Association, can only be achieved by your support. Thus in 1976, remember your Association needs you.

On the umpiring scene, the year has held its usual points of interest. Once again, the full requirement of Field Umpires was never attained, and as usual, many "Double Headers" were experienced. In the selected panel of 56; two umpires failed to front, and during the season retirements or forced retirements accounted for another eleven. This means, that in the situation where all the remaining umpires are fit and available, 43 are available for 60 appointments in anyone weekend - a very difficult assignment without doubling up.

The problem still seems to lie with the recruitment of Field Umpires. This will need to be looked at, especially with the thoughts of two Field Umpires being considered. Obviously, the main areas of recruitment must be through the Umpires School and Junior Councils. This season for instance, four members of the Umpires School were included on the Field Panel, and of these only two completed the season. Thus, the need appears to be for promotion of umpiring. Possibly, looking at Junior Councils, with the aim of encouraging promising umpires to join our Panel. The problem is a big one; and the solution will not be an easy one.

The turnover of umpires for 1975 was the lowest for many years. The Umpires Appointment Board once again gave most umpires the opportunity to show their ability in city ranks. This scheme certainly has merit, as it was only a few years ago that some umpires were never seen in the city even though they had been on the Panel for five or more years. However, as I mentioned last year, there is a need for more guidance and direction for young umpires, prior to their reaching city ranks. This can be achieved by these umpires being observed in the Alcock Cup Competition or near Country Leagues. This then would prepare the umpire more thoroughly with the required fundamentals and make his promotion to city ranks more justifiable.

Let me now turn to comments on the overall functioning of the Association during the season.

### MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Our President, ROSS CAPES has concluded his second year in this capacity. Once again Ross has proved a great ambassador for our Association both on and off the field. The success and smooth functioning of the season undoubtedly stems from Ross's dedication, guidance and direction, to all Association matters. Even with the pressure of Association matters and engagements, Ross has been able to maintain his place as the top umpire in the State, and certainly within the top bracket in Australia, which is certainly a tribute in itself. Full marks to Ross for his astute leadership, and may we look forward with confidence to 1976, with our very popular President at the reigns once again. To you Ross my personal thanks and sincere appreciation for your assistance and timely help throughout the season.

Our finances were once again in the expert hands of our popular Treasurer, BRIAN COLLETT. Each month Brian furnishes the Management Committee with an update report on all our financial committments. His careful budgeting has enabled us to plan all functions, so as to come out on the correct side of the ledger. Brian, on behalf of all Members may I express our sincere gratitude for your efforts for our Association during the past season. They are truly appreciated by all concerned. Please also accept my personal thanks for your kind assistance and guidance in times of need.

The SOCIAL COMMITTEE has been looked after by two great stalwarts of the Association in TERRY NEILSON as Chairman, and DICK STUBBERFIELD as the Social Secretary. Once again all our functions have been thoroughly organized and planned. I feel that the variety of organized functions has been really tremendous, and full praise must go to these gentlemen and their Committee for their endeavours to satisfy all tastes. Once again the only disappointing feature has been the poor support, given by you the members. Fortunately we have been saved by a couple of our members having lots of friends. The Ladies Committee has continued to function, and their efforts for our Association have been nothing short of magnificent. To Terry and Dick, a great effort in 1975 - thanks again for your wonderful support and assistance. To the Social Committee, as a whole, a very big thank you for your very valuable time and effort in making 1975 such a big success off the field

Our Junior Vice President BARRY McKENZIE deserves special mention here for his efforts for our Association. Barry has proved a very loyal and conscientious worker for our Association. His contributions include the Chairman of the Colour Steering Committee, and with his partner in crime DON WAKENSHAW the general up keep and improvement of conditions of our changerooms at the W.A.C.A.

Although, I have left them to last, it's certainly not for lack of effort, for our Management Committee have played a very significant role in the overall functioning of Association matters. Once again, their attendance has been excellent and at all times, they have been prepared to discuss and act on all matters which they feel will be for the betterment of umpiring. Thus I acknowledge with thanks the efforts of TREVOR CANT; ILLIFFE DOVER; BRIAN HAIGH; TREVOR HAWORTH; GREG SOLIN; STEVEN SPARKMAN and DON WAKENSHAW. May I also pay a special tribute to the wives who prepared supper for our Committee Meetings at individuals homes during the season - it was surely appreciated.

# UMPIRES' APPOINTMENT BOARD

Certainly, 1975 wouldn't have been an easy year for the Umpires Appointment Board. Once again their decisions published in each Thursday's "West Australian" bring glee to some, and woe to others. Their task is a thankless one, but at all times they carry out the selection policy to the best of their ability. As in any sport, Selectors, will be always criticised; naturally it would be a funny old world if everyone agreed with every decision that was made.

Mr. BRIAN PURSLOWE, the new Vice President of the W.A.N.F.L. was given the role of Chairman of the Umpires Appointment Board. The other members included Mr. RAY SLEETH; Mr. RAY SCOTT and Mr. LINDSAY JOHNSTON. Once again the Appointment Board endeavoured to view as many umpires as possible in City Games and at near Country Centres. This should certainly add to the encouragement of the younger umpires, and from an Association viewpoint, one would sincerely hope these fellows are prepared to use this assistance to the best possible advantage in the future.

On the disappointing side, one must be critical of the big number of umpires who failed to honour their commitments during the season. Some retired, others were unavailable for a number of weeks; others were out with sickness and injuries, all making the Appointment Board's task more difficult. I feel that most were legitimate excuses, but I sincerely believe that there were a few "fractured eye brows" amongst them. In the same way, the effect was felt by fellow umpires who had to fill in for those not available. It is important to remember, that if you accept the challenge to umpire; then give it 100%. Our Association is not judged on the individual, but by the members who make it up.

The Appointment Board this year was assisted by six independent observers, and at this stage may we acknowledge the efforts of RAY WHITFIELD; GEOFF HAVERCROFT; MAX PINNER; DON ALLEN; JERRY STOKES and NED MARTINO, in submitting their comprehensive reports, and at the same time contributing towards the improvement of umpiring standards.

# UMPIRES' ADVISER

Thanks and appreciation are extended to our Umpires' Adviser Mr. RAY SLEETH and his Assistant Mr. RAY SCOTT for the many hours of duty in promoting and improving umpiring in our State, during the past season.

### UMPIRES' TRAINING SUPERVISOR

This year saw the return of our very popular Training Supervisor in HAL SYMONS. Hal joined us at the Annual Training Camp at Point Peron in February, and on the track each Tuesday and Thursday night at the W.A.C.A. Once again

we record our sincere appreciation, for his time and efforts in building up and maintaining our top physical fitness. It was great to have you back on the track Hal. Any umpire whose fitness didn't measure up could only blame himself, for Hal provided us with every opportunity to be in top class condition.

One thing, though Hal that I noticed - when you first started training us, you used to run round with us - three years ago you would cut across the centre and catch us up - now you wait for us to come round each time - is this a sign of something?? Anyway Hal, we look forward to your assistance and guidance again in 1976 - thanks also for all the little extras for our Association.

### COUNTRY FOOTBALL

This season saw big fee increases for our country umpires, which was most welcome. However, the long travelling and the long hours still create problems. I don't feel that any reward can compensate for being away from families each Sunday, week after week. We can only hope that understanding can continue, and our Members will continue to serve our many Country Friends again in 1976.

Along with fee increases, we welcomed two new Associations to our Panel this year - Ongerup Football Association and Murray Districts Football Association, bringing our total to fourteen Country Districts regularly served by our umpires. This season saw the first overnight double/headers at Katanning. Feelings varied as to its popularity, but I would appreciate any comments or suggestions for next season.

Relationships with our Country Friends have been generally very good. Again a couple of non appearances and late arrivals marred a good year.

This year saw the introduction of a standard Workers' Compensation Cover for all Country Leagues administered by our Association, and arranged through the State Government Insurance Office. The Scheme was undoubtedly very successful, enabling our Association to submit all the required papers, without the time consuming interchange of correspondence with Country Leagues. Admittedly, it meant extra work on our part, but in the long run it saved many headaches.

Finally, a comment on the rumoured reduction in number of Country Leagues served by our Umpires in 1976. Personally, I feel this would be a backward step for Country Football and Umpiring in general. One now has to only look at the standard of umpiring in minor grades in the country. Furthermore, W.A.N.F.L. Panel Umpires have been serving Country Districts for over twenty years, and I can see no reason why this service should now be terminated. The only answer seems to be more umpires, which means more promotion in their recruitment by the W.A.N.F.L. Umpiring strength can only be maintained by one united band of umpires, and I feel this scheme will do little to improve the overall standard in Western Australia.

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### LIFE MEMBERSHIP

The decision of the Management Committee will be given during the Annual General Meeting.

### FINANCE

Once again, we have managed to come out in front. However, the continual spiralling costs present problems, and make budgeting a difficult assignment. Unfortunately subscriptions and general costs will need to be reviewed in the coming season.

Even though, our resources have been doubly taxed with trip shows also eating into our pockets, I feel all members should be congratulated for their support, which prevented our Treasurer Brian Collett from going completely grey. Anyway Brian, thanks for your efforts in maintaining a healthy financial position in 1975.

# UMPIRES' TRAINERS

In 1975 your Management Committee appointed for the first time, a Head Trainer, in Mr. Ron Holford. The scheme worked very successfully, with Ron taking charge of all trainers, their rostering and problems. For the first time, we have trainers at all League Grounds most Saturdays as well as two present on Tuesday and Thursday evenings.

Once again the W.A.N.F.L. assisted us by subsidising our payments for the trainers.

May we record with gratitude, our thanks and appreciation to Ron and his merry men - namely JIMMY O'CONNELL, WAYNE REYNOLDS and MAT DUFFY for their time, interest and support, for the 'men in white'.

### SOCIALLY

Our Social Committee must be congratulated once again for the quality of the functions organized during the past season. Furthermore, along with the quality, came variety; where they endeavoured to cater for every possible interest. May I say they achieved their objectives, but unfortunately their efforts were not always rewarded by attendance.

The Annual Ball, which is always one of our calendar highlights, although almost breaking even was not as successful attendance wise as in the past. Possibly, the increased charge may have influenced some to stay away, but when one considers our charge with comparable functions, ours is the more reasonable. Thus I feel, our newly elected Social Committee may have to look closely at holding a Ball in 1976, if they cannot be assured of its success.

May I compliment the Social Committee, namely TERRY NEILSON; DICK STUBBER-FIELD; BARRY McKENZIE; DON WAKENSHAW; BRIAN COLLETT; EVAN DUNSTAN; RON POWELL; GREG SOLIN; TREVOR HAWORTH and PETER TROODE, plus wives for their efforts. The Social Committee Report is covered by Terry and Dick, elswhere in this report.

# TREASURER'S REPORT

Gentlemen,

Our achievements over the last twelve months have been satisfactory and are due to the hard working efforts of your Management and Social Committees, together with your co-operation and the results are shown in the Statement of Affairs accompanying this report.

Our Reserve Account has a balance of \$2,283.62 and the Current Account has a balance of \$218.07. The total funds have therefore, increased by \$404.01.

This result was most pleasing considering the substantial increase in administration costs, honoraria and trainers fees. Even though the financial results of our Annual Ball and River Trip were most disappointing, the results achieved in the balance of our Social Functions were such, that we were able to absorb these additional costs. Also, the interest obtained from our Reserve Account contributed handsomely to our overall result.

I am delighted to report that 100% subscriptions were collected in this last year and I would like to express my appreciation for your co-operation in this area.

May I pass on my sincere vote of thanks, on behalf of our Committees, to the members who donated their 1974 "Gold Coat" payments to the Association. As promised, these funds have been used to improve the training facilities enjoyed by all of us. Improvement to the showers have been made, the purchase of rubber matting and the vibrator, still leave a credit of \$129.71 in this Fund. Together with the 1975 contributions our programme of improvement will continue and any suggestions that you, the members may have in this area, will be welcomed.

In conclusion, we can look forward to the 1976 Season with a good deal of confidence and I would like to take this opportunity to express my thanks to the Management and Social Committees and to you the members, for the support given to me during the past twelve months.
