

Future of the Game

The underlying philosophy of the administrators of Australian Rules Football is one which encourages people to be spectators and/or participants.

At the junior level, the belief that sport is a socialising agent necessarily encourages administrators of various sports to structure their respective games to enhance the player's acquisition of social skills. Therefore we have observed the introduction of modified laws designed to optimise the development of each participant.

The social significance of institutionalised games should not be underestimated and s the responsibility of umpires, coaches and administrators to ensure the junior forms of football are fully supported and continually revised.

At the senior level, the belief that sport provides opportunities for social interaction, intrinsic reward, achievement, and extrinsic reward necessarily encourages administrators to structure games so that each of these elements are attainable.

A^tmateur football (competitions other than league) cannot provide significant extrinsic rewards (match payments) and therefore needs to strengthen the posture of the other three elements. Typically those clubs that have social facilities, on-field success and several teams in different grades are well supported.

League football is an elite competition with spectator appeal. Therefore its structure and administration necessarily differs from all other forms of Australian Rules.

Many professionals are supported by league football revenue. Therefore it is essential to maintain spectator interest. This can be achieved by ensuring the presence of factors which result in spectator enjoyment. In Australian Rules Football, spectator enjoyment is typically derived from team success, individual player success, high marking, physical clashes, accurate systematic passing, goal kicking, mob hysteria, uncertainty of a result and others.

League football also provides the opportunity for participants to pursue elitism. Coaches and administrators who optimise the development of elite players will cessarily increase the spectator interest in Australian Rules Football.

Assuming that the above philosophies are accepted for each level, then the future of the game must be guided by these philosophies. However, it is imperative that the strategies applied to any of the three levels (amateur, junior and league) are unique to that level unless the strategy reflects all philosophies.

Several possible changes to the game of Australian Rules Football are being investigated. Some of these are:

an efficient grading system for junior football which results in even competitions;

• the removal of premiership points in junior competition and the emphasis on individual and team development rather than club success;

• the introduction of the 'send-off' rule into league football;

greater support for the development of amateur football;

- the development of Australian Institute of Sport and other elite squads at all levels;
- the reduction of violence at all levels by introducing more severe penalties;
- the introduction of a national competition at a club or state level and
- the rationalisation of expenditure at all levels.

All of these and other possible changes must be considered in relation to their impact on the overall philosophy of Australian Rules Football. If those people directly involved in implementing change are cognisant of the social impact of their decisions then Australian Rules will have a future.

President's Report - Ron Buckey

I take pleasure in presenting this report at the completion of the 1985 season, the Centenary Year of football for the WAFL Following the pre-season drama and upheaval, the season ended on a very happy note on Grand Final Night.

The year saw considerable achievements both on and off the field, for individuals and the Association.

All umpires are to be congratulated for the ofessional manner in which they carried out their duties throughout the season.

The past few seasons have seen a number of senior Field Umpires retire. This has enabled a number of our younger umpires to gain valuable experience at senior level. It is to their credit that they performed extremely well. Sure they were not without the usual share of criticism from those ill-informed critics. However some of it was deserved.

Umpiring is an important part in the future development of the game.

Far too much attention and emphasis is focused on umpiring by both the electronic and print media, which also encourages club officials to join the band wagon. The result of all this gives a very poor image of football umpiring. The end result is that the recruitment of young umpires at league level is very difficult both in quality and quantity.

The Association and umpires alike will need to work hard at having a great rapport with the media and club officials. This will mean that umpires should develop a personality and know how to understand other personalities. This can be achieved mpires are encouraged and trained to develop a personality. Umpires should be made more accessible to the media and projected to the public in the correct manner.

At the direction of the membership, your Committee set about the restoration of fees which had fallen behind over a number of seasons. This resulted in the Committee setting up a sub committee to review the past agreements and the present situation. After many hours of discussion, a detailed proposal was submitted to the Umpires' Board in December 1984. A number of meetings were held with the Umpires' Board which resulted in a final agreement being reached. However, a WAFL representative intervened, calling an urgently convened meeting to advise that the Umpires' Board had no power to arrive at any agreements with the Association. He advised that new discussions would take place over new fees for the ensuing season. The Fees Committee and the Management Committee rejected this proposal very strongly on the grounds that agreements had been reached.

It is now history what happened. The League in their wisdom returned all application forms while advertising for new umpires at different rates than those accepted. The Umpires' Association and its total membership withdrew their services from all practice games until the matter was resolved to the satisfaction of the Executive. The Association's Executive requested the Director of Football for the WAFL call a meeting to discuss the situation. After numerous phone calls over the weekend and a further meeting with the WAFL, the dispute was resolved to the Association's satisfaction. Minor ground was given in two categories of field umpiring.

This dispute was totally unnecessary, very time consuming and highly disruptive to all umpires training.

I would like to record my personal thanks to all the Fees Committee for the very many hours of involvement and for their very professional approach. Those members were Messrs Rob Hendrie, Neville Lewis and Don McComish.

Training venues still present a problem to the Association. The lack of a permane pre-season venue presents a major problem. This season we were able to use McGillivray Oval on loan from the University of Western Australia. The Association was very happy with the grounds and facilities provided. It is to be hoped that the WAFL can make a long term commitment for this pre-season venue. The WACA ground was not available for training due to major upgrading of the playing surface. Nearby Haig Park was utilised with the changeroom at the WACA being made available. Next season should see full training taking place on the WACA. This, along with the use of the Members Bar facilities, should be of great benefit for all umpires.

Your committee once again worked tirelessly for the needs of its members and I take this opportunity to thank all for their efforts throughout the season.

Ross Graffin, your Secretary, fulfilled his duties in a very capable manner. This was Ross's first year as Secretary in what is a difficult position to fill. The Association can look forward to further good work from Ross.

Rob Hendrie, our Treasurer, I cannot speak highly enough of the work Rob has'given this Association. Rob's presentation of the books typifies his professional ability as a Manager of the highest order. I have learnt to appreciate his excellent support, particularly when the going was tough, his capacity to work under pressure is first class. The Association is indeed fortunate to have Rob controlling the financial affairs of its members. Rob's management abilities were best shown when he totally organise this year's National Umpires' Conference here in Perth. It was well organised a... enjoyed by all delegates who attended. Former goal umpire Les Leicester assisted very capably.

To Barry Grimmond and his Social Committee, congratulations on a very successful year of social events. Barry is a very dedicated and energetic worker for this Association. It is a shame that the Social Committee does not receive more support and participation from all its members, instead of the usual group.

Other members of your Committee, Vice President Damian Green; Committeemen Neville Lewis, Gil Bishop, Ron Poole, Hayden McAuliffe, Bill McKune and Geoff Palmer, performed numerous tasks and duties throughout the season in a very positive and capable manner.

On behalf of the members, I take this opportunity to say a very big thank you to

our official sponsor, Ampol. Once again, they provided a trip for a major prize along with other cash incentive awards. The Association's presentation night was totally supported by Ampol. We thank Ampol, through Tony Rapson and Ross Benzie, for the continued support of the Ampol Company.


Well done, our Grand Final and Interstate Umpires who represented your Association in a very capable manner.

This year saw the inception of a city squad of 35 field umpires who umpired purely in the metropolitan region.


Once again, a representative indoor cricket team took out the A reserve premiership and the golf team won the 'plate' at Wanneroo.



Finally, thanks to each and every member of the Association for their support of Ron Buckey and his Committee and may your personal aims be justly rewarded in 1986. Good luck!




John Devine's Report

With the end of season 1985, it is important also to review the state of our bodies. Almost without exception we will need a few weeks of rest to let our bodies recover; for those minor tears, aches and pains to clear after nine months of continuous training.


If you have been "carrying" any type of injury which has persisted, seek advice from a doctor who is well versed in sporting injuries. Don't delay — remember that the most common cause of sports injuries results from overwork.

It is suggested that your usual running routine be changed during the months of October and November by restriction to "easy runs" of between 6-10km. Concentration on swimming, bike riding, tennis or squash during these two months would be a worthwhile supplement.

It is unlikely that training will commence prior to mid-January at the earliest; accordingly, it is recommended that your concentration on running be increased in early December and after a few weeks of building up the mileage, at least one day per week be devoted to faster work — suggest fartlek style.

Flexibility exercises should be continued throughout the off-season and their intensity and range progressively increased from the start of December. Weights for the upper part of the body certainly wouldn't go astray.

Good running into season 1986.



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
Secretary's Report

Apart from the fees dispute, the Association and the WAFL have had an improved relationship throughout the year, including a meeting between the League's Umpires' Board and our Management Committee in which many points were cleared up.

PRESIDENT

The Association was most fortunate in gaining the highly professional services of Mr Ron Buckey for this year. Ron's rapport with both the members and those external agents that the Association deals with, is of the highest calibre, and our present standing has much to do with our President's efforts in 1985.

Unfortunately, Ron has resigned from the position for next year due to several propositions being forwarded to him. It is pleasing to know we have experienced men in the stands watching over the umpires, but it is even better being out in the middle with someone with experience, and at this stage, there aren't too many in that bracket. All the best, Ron.

VICE PRESIDENT:

Damian Green has filled in admirably during the times Ron hasn't been present. Damian has an expanding business and is finding it increasingly difficult to combine statis football, work, Management Committee and family all in the same time span. His work on the Committee is greatly appreciated.

TREASURER:

Rob Hendrie has handled the Association's finances in a most professional manner and our thanks are extended to him. Geoff Palmer has helped Rob out during the rush times and this has made his job more manageable.

SOGIAL SECRETARY:

Barry Gimmond took on this very difficult position for 1985, and handled it with aplomb. For the first time, the Association engaged a small committee under Barry's guidance to help with the running of our social affairs. 
CONCLUSION:

Treasurer's Report

Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting the 1984/85 Treasurer's Report, which includes details of Income and Expenditure, Balance Sheet and Funds Position.

At the recommendation of our previous Auditor Brian Eddy, and as mentioned in last year's report, a write off of Plant and Equipment has been undertaken this year to reveal a more realistic market value. Consequently, a surplus of \$247 is the result for the 12 months ended 15th October, 1985.

A healthy Funds Position Statement prevails because of the following factors:

- 1) Provision of \$600 being Legal Fees for Constitution amendments.
- 2) Provision of \$800 being Printing Costs for 1985 Year Book.
- 3) Reimbursement of \$650 from Darryl Gillies for Legal Fees previously expended.
- 4) Non requirement to utilise Interest Earned on Reserve Funds.

Income during the past 12 months was \$3,763 more than last year's income which can be mainly attributed to higher Subscriptions and also a very successful Grand Final Tipping Ticket innovation, that replaced the 200 Club of previous seasons.

Social functions were organised by Barry Grimmond, most competently, which generated the bulk of the remaining increase. Well done Barry.

Expenditure increased by \$2,167, which is more than accounted for by the write off of Plant and Equipment (\$2,245).

The increase in Committee entertainment expenditure for 1985 was due to Teal Cup Umpires and State Game Umpires' luncheons (\$341) for which we were previously reimbursed by the WAFL. This year the Association did not approach the WAFL for reimbursement.

Social functions that were held in 1984 but not repeated in 1985 have been included in this year's accounts under the one heading "Social Functions — Other".

Whilst a provision of \$800 for year book costs has been made, your Management Committee has since been able to arrange numerous private sponsorships totallin \$1,200 which will cover all expenses.

Consequently, the 1986 year will commence with the Association in a very strong financial positon, which should allow the incoming Social Secretary to organise some very favourable functions for members.

I extend my thanks to Bob Phillips, our Auditor for 1985, for the expedient manner in which he audited our books and of course, for his personal time he devoted to the task.

To Geoff Palmer, my unofficial assistant this year, I extend my gratitude for a job well done. Good luck "partner" in your new role as Social Secretary.

As a final note for the 1985 season, may I say that this year the Association has been served by a truly professional President in Ron Buckey and it has been indeed a pleasure to team with all other Management Committee members under Ron's guidance, to serve the needs of all our members.

Best wishes to you all for a happy festive season — I hope to see you and your wallet again in 1986.



Delegates again stressed that the NFLUA should write to the three major Leagues (Vic, SA & WA) requesting a swap of Field Ummpires for the Home and Away Game immediately prior to the State game between those States. Although WA and SA do have this policy in force at present, Victoria have not been too keen and it was the view of all delegates of the NFLUA that it would be a worthwhile approach in view of the likely "National" competition getting off the ground.

Public Liability

The WANFLUA has now taken out a \$1M public risk policy for protection of members and guests at social functions.

Monthly Report

In view of the fact that no newsletter was forthcoming from the NFLUA Secretary in 1985, delegates expressed strong disappointment. Secretary stated that communication was done more on a NFLUA and a particular State basis by way of oral communications.


Delegates requested an exchange of information in 1986 on the basis of NFLUA providing copies to all States.

Assault of Umpires

The VFLUA delegates informed the meeting that it was a firm policy in Victoria for members, if assaulted on the day of a game, to contact the local police before that umpire leaves the area. In all cases, members provide a statement to police and lay a civil charge.

AFC Fees

When applying for the 1985 AFC fees, as recommended by the 1984 NFLUA meeting, the NFLUA Secretary was advised that future negotiations were to be handled by the VFL, rather than the AFC.

Agreement has been reached that the 1986 AFC home and away fee be equal to the VFL base fee. The VFLUA has not yet negotiated its 1986 fees with the VFL but they propose to seek an increase equal to CPI.

The NFLUA Secretary will advise member States of the set AFC fees once the VFL base fee has been approved.

Affiliation Fees

To remain at \$85 for 1986.

Conference Subsidies

For future conferences, pooling of total air fares may be considered as an alternative to providing subsidies to the minor states.

Presentation Pack

As a gesture of goodwill, WANFLUA President Ron Buckey presented all visiting delegates with a bottle of Margaret River wine and a WAFL Centenary badge which were donated to our Association.

Delegates were also presented with a WAFL Centenary Tie, which we were required to pay for.

Umpires' Development

The West Australian Football League has acknowledged the need to undertake a programme of recruitment and education for umpires at all levels of football throughout the State, with the appointment of an Umpires' Development Officer. Closely aligned with this thrust is the role being played by Dr Brian Douge as Director of Coaching. These positions are aimed at meeting the ongoing development of football in WA and developing positive relationships between key participants.

During 1985 a variety of initiatives were introduced and implemented in the metropolitan and country areas.

- Umpire education: an accreditation system was devised with accompanying manuals being produced for Basic and Level I courses. A series of seminars were conducted in regional centres and metropolitan junior councils and trialled is private colleges for Year 10 students.
- Advisor education: a residential seminar was conducted for advisors from all football associations/councils. The course was designed to provide participants with basic requirements.
- Umpire promotion: in an endeavour to focus positive publicity on umpires, regular articles were placed in football publications. Minor problems hopefully have been rectified for 1986.
- **Consultancy:** regular trips were undertaken to regional centres to conduct lectures and training sessions.
- **Recruitment:** observation of young promising umpires occurred throughout the season and regular interaction with junior council advisors ensured promotion of WAFL policies. A cadet squad of umpires has been selected to undergo specific skills and training sessions in preparation for 1986.

The Future

- courses for members of the WAFL panel will be conducted early in 1986. These are designed to cover the many facets involved in achieving success as an umpire.
- courses for advisors and WAFL observers will be held to develop essential skills.
- production of a promotion/recruitment film on umpiring.
- development of educational aids/kits for use by advisors, associations and individual umpires.
- on-going development of young umpires at all levels.
- Basic and Level I seminars to be conducted in regional centres and the metropolitan area.
- on-going promotion of umpiring and umpires.
- I wish to thank members of the WAFL panel for their interest and support in 1985 and look forward to this continuing in 1986.

Junior Council Report

In 1985, umpiring in the League's eight junior councils made further advancements due largely to the guidance of the umpires' advisors, each of whom provided varied training programmes and fine leadership.

The League will again in 1986 appoint the advisors and through the **development programme** provide the necessary support and advice. Members of the WAFL senior panel assisted during 1985 by making themselves available to attend training sessions at selected councils. This is an important component in the development of young umpires as it presents a **successful model** and helps in the building of a **positive self image.** Due to its success, this practice will hopefully be expanded in 1986.

The junior councils have in the past produced many of the League's senior umpires d this is sure to continue in the future. A squad of young umpires with potential to advance to higher levels of football has been selected from all councils to undergo specialised training with the WAFL's Umpires' Development Officer, Brian Appleby. This is the first year in which such a squad has been chosen and the progress of each member will be closely monitored.

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Umpiring and the Exercisaholic



Over the past month, the kids have been yelled at, the wife avoided and every day at work seems like a Monday. All those jobs you promised to do around the house when the season finished have still not been started.

The wife still hasn't been taken out to dinner on a Friday night — just the two of you; and the kids still haven't been for that picnic you promised them. No, you've not contracted some incurable disease, it's just withdrawal symptoms associated with exercisaholism.

• Each year around the end of September, sportsmen across Australia suffer the same kind of symptoms. The latest theory behind it all is endorphins.

Endorphins are naturally produced chemicals in the brain, which are closely related to that other well known addictive pain killer called morphine. It seems that physical exercise, including horizontal kinds, stimulates the brain to release endorphins, resulting in a feeling of contentment, satisfaction and well being. Continuous stimulation of the brain in this way leads to a psychological dependence. Take away this stimulation, and you get the same effect as taking away someone's morphine; that is, withdrawal symptoms.

Cheer up, the condition is not permanent! By Christmas, numbers of early joggers will once again start to take to the roads, beaches and golf courses. Families will be smiling and work seem tolerable.

Beware the risk of enthusiasm!

You were running 10-15 kilometres a couple of months back, but don't forget you were doing that 3-4 times per week plus a game on the weekend.

So what is the solution?


Possibly the body will produce enough endorphins to keep you and the family satisfied if you can sustain exercise for half an hour at least 3-4 times per week. That is not the same as doing 1 hour's hard exercise once or twice a week. The reason is that endorphins rise quickly to reach an optimum after 15-20 minutes and then the rise after that is more gradual. Secondly, it is a good idea to vary the exercise.

Horizontal exercise is equivalent to a 5 kilometre walk (1/2 hours swimming! What do you think I meant?) Any other aerobic exercise is equally efficient in maintaining endorphin levels. (Aerobic exercises are those using large muscle groups requiring large amounts of oxygen.)

l strongly recommend joining (or taking) the wife at her aerobics. Tennis or squash, cycling, swimming and jogging are the mainstays.

Follow this prescription for natural endorphins production and I guarantee you an enjoyable summer, lots of completed projects around the home, interest in work and most importantly, a family that loves you again.





Looking to the Future

It is with enthusiasm that I look forward to the challenge of being WAFL Umpires' Coach for the 1986 season.

There is no doubt that umpiring has been through a difficult period in recent times, brought about to some degree by the retirement of many senior umpires.

This has enabled younger inexperienced umpires to have the opportunity to umpire at senior level and they have been subjected, I believe, to some unfair and unwarranted criticism.

ne would be naive to expect all of this to disappear in uture, as criticism is part and parcel of this occupation.

I am of the firm belief that we have within our panel the nucleus of a professional and dedicated group of umpires. However, there are others who will be required to show considerable improvement in attitude and application if they wish to be considered for senior umpiring appointments.



Additional pressure will also be applied on field umpires in the coming seasons, as a cadet squad of twenty five promising umpires has been selected from junior council ranks for specialised training, and it is anticipated that umpires from this group will quickly infiltrate into the WAFL panel.

During the past season, there was ample proof of what can be achieved when umpires are prepared to accept the challenge, with improved performances by certain umpires resulting in appointments to levels not previously envisaged.

It should always be remembered that you invariably get out of umpiring what you are prepared to put in.

I have no doubt that during the 1986 season, opportunities will become available in all umpiring categories for umpires to officiate at levels above those previously achieved.

Other umpires who have already officiated at senior levels are reminded that they cannot rest on their laurels, as they have set standards which, at the least, are expected to be maintained, and in other cases, as a result of experience gained, will be expected to be improved upon.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to wish you a relaxing break from umpiring, during which time I would request that you maintain a level of fitness which will enable you to fulfil the physical demands of January pre-season training.


