PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Jerome Mohen

2016 was a year with many highlights for the association, including:

- The successful introduction of match day communication systems for field umpires in all grades;
- The continued growth of the WANFLUA social calendar, with another spectacular Hall of Fame function at Bells Functions Centre to induct former greats Gavin Statham, Graham Daniel and David Shawcross; and
- The successful completion of a second fundraising venture with Racing and Wagering Western Australia (RWVA) following the 2016 season which netted a gross \$54,000.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the 2016 WANFLUA Committee for their tireless and selfless contributions throughout the 2016 season. Special thanks must also go to WANFLUA Vice President Ashley Coster for his brilliant management of the day-to-day logistics around the fundraising venture with RWVA. Furthermore, I would like to thank outgoing committee members Yarraan Street and Reuben Garlett for their valued contributions to our association over several years.

As is detailed in the 2016 Financial Report, the association is in a strong financial position due to the funds raised through recent fundraising efforts. We expect that the association may be provided further opportunities from RWVA to continue the fundraising efforts. Whilst being a strong advocate to ensure funds raised by current members are spent for their benefit (as evidenced by the implementation of the match day communication systems), it is important the current cash surplus held by the WANFLUA is utilised to ensure the longevity of the association and for meaningful asset purchases. The funds raised through fundraising activities cannot be relied upon to fund working capital requirements such as functions and/or subsidising subscription costs. This is primarily due to the uniqueness of the current fundraising opportunity and the fact that it is not a guaranteed source of income.

From mid-2017, the association will also be engaging with the WAFC to negotiate the next MOU agreement which will cover the 2018 and 2019 seasons. Should members have any matters which they wish to be



raised in these discussions regarding the terms and conditions WANFLUA umpires receive, they should notify any member of the WANFLUA committee in writing.

In 2016 I came to the decision that it was time for me to finalise my umpiring career to focus on other hobbies and interests and my work career. At the completion of 2016, I have now completed three years as the WANFLUA's president. In this time, our association has achieved many successes of which I have been truly proud to be a part. There remain several matters which I believe the association would truly profit from, and which I set out to achieve upon taking on this role. These include:

- Centralising and making electronic all past and present WANFLUA documentation and media;
- Further improving the engagement of life members;
- Properly creating and recognising a past umpires group and ensuring their inclusion, along with past coaches, trainers and affiliates and enabling their participation in future WANFLUA activities;

- Creating a detailed report and recommendations for the next WANFLUA Executive for efficiency measures and changes to create an association which is less onerous to operate whilst maintaining the current level of service to members; and
- Ensuring the implementation of a tribunal system where umpires attend via video link from the umpires training base to ensure that umpires are not missing valuable training whilst also attending to their tribunal duties.

As such, if elected, I intend to continue as president until the end of 2017 to see these projects through to completion. Ash and I do not intend to nominate for the roles of President and Vice President following the completion of the 2017 season. Accordingly, if re-elected for the 2017 season, we are hopeful that members wishing to take over these executive roles for the 2018 season will come forward early in the 2017

season so that we can work on an organised handover of the roles for the betterment of all members.

I would like to thank you all once again for entrusting me with representing you and the WANFLUA again in 2016. The WANFLUA is an amazing organisation filled with incredible people which I am truly proud to be represent and be part of. Thank you once again to all people who assist in making the WANFLUA the great place it is and give their time to improve the social environment and terms and conditions which all umpires enjoy today.

Thank you also specifically to Mark Worobec and Michael Washbourne for their work in creating this year's yearbook.

TREASURER'S REPORT

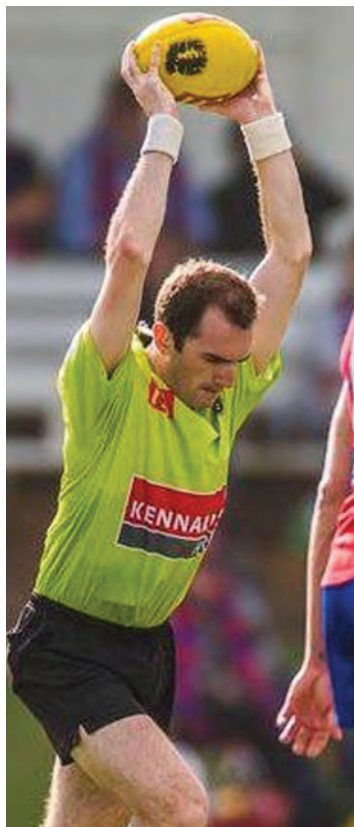

FIELD UMPIRES REPORT

Craig O'Donoghue, Head Coach

A chair in the middle of the room in November signified the theme for 2016 – Pick me. Generational change had occurred in the group following the retirements of iconic figures Stuart Parry and Scott McPhee. To lose 12 grand finals and more than 500 games of experience in one hit created both a chasm and an opportunity. Jordy Wright's decision to take the year off further impacted upon the experience within the group. But it was clear that those who remained had an incredible opportunity to step up.

We asked for people to make us pick them and the umpires delivered. Matt Adams won the Capes Medal after showcasing his skill and experience during the pre-season. Matt also officiated in a NAB Challenge game and was flown to Melbourne to umpire a VFL match as part of the AFL's rookie program.

Nathan Williamson, Mark Worobec, Justin Power created history by becoming the first trio of field umpires to make their league Grand Final debut in the same game. Nathan and Wora also officiated in the State Game, JP won the Rosebury Medal and Nathan the Montgomery Medal.

Justin Power, Jordan Fry, Trent McPhee and Ben Laycock also made their League finals debuts. Curtis Snadden, Leigh Retallack, Dan Johanson, Louis Jago, Jason O'Malley and Blake Evans all made their league debuts. Throw in 10 Reserves debuts and nine Colts debuts and it was clear that many people followed our mantra – Pick Me.

But of all the "Pick Me" moments which stood out, Nathan Williamson's effort post-season took the cake when he earned himself an AFL contract. It had been too long between drinks for the WA-based AFL hopefuls. Nathan kicked the door open and will move to Melbourne to pursue his dream.

The year also saw Matt Carpenter and Gabby Simmonds return from the serious injuries which robbed them of their 2015 seasons. Unfortunately Yarraan Streat's ankle required further surgery, but he is on the road to recovery.

Jerome Mohen retired mid-season and his contribution to umpiring through his work as WANFLUA president has been significant.



There were many changes to how we coached in 2016. We introduced new development programs such as 10 Bounce Tuesday and Watch This Wednesday. Match-Comm vests improved communication and the Jeff Dagleish Medal, Trevor Garrett Medal and Scott McPhee Medal gave people internal awards to strive for. We aimed to create elite standards which gave everyone the best opportunity to get the most out of their careers.

An expanded MDC team allowed coaches to focus on their strengths to teach people different areas of umpiring. This included implementing a three-man selection panel to give a wider range of views each week. Graeme Zanich's role as the Reserves coach also ensured the selection committee always had someone pushing for those who were performing well at that level.

The addition of numerous ex-Grand Final umpires to the coaching team provided a strong insight into what it takes to succeed. To have Grant Vernon return to the group to teach umpires about the elite standards required to be successful had a huge impact.

It was regularly said that it doesn't matter if you are 17 or 35, we will pick you if you perform. We had a 29-year-old league debutant, a 30-year-old who made his grand final debut and a teenager who made his finals debut.

The 2016 season showed we have a strong depth of talent on the list.

I was very pleased how the umpires – both old and new – bought into what the camp stood for: Hard work, fellowship and a united philosophy, which set us up for a successful season.

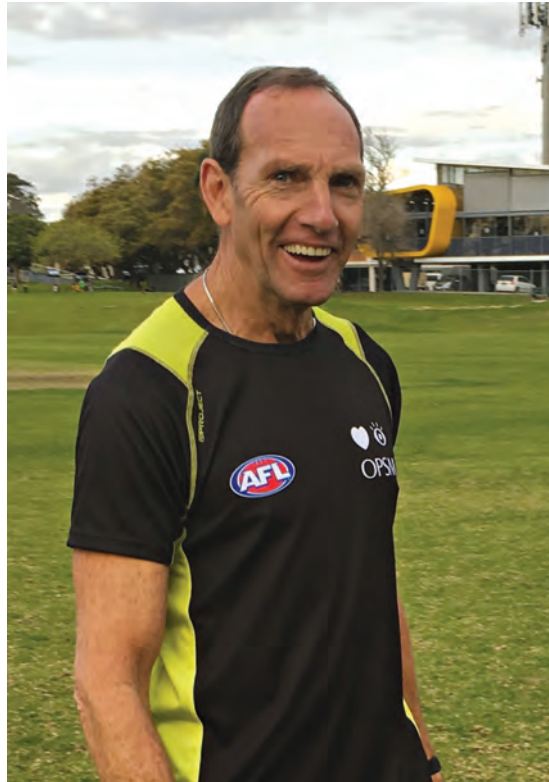

GOAL UMPIRES REPORT

John Marrapodi, Head Coach

2016 was my second year as WAFL/AFL State Goal Umpire Coach. This meant I had the challenge of building on what was achieved in 2015 and to work towards improving on the high standard which had been set.

In 2016, a standard goal umpire assessment process was implemented across all three grades. As result, of the 540 appointments made throughout the season, a total of 534 appointed umpires were 'Match Day Coached' and received a match assessment. The aim was to 'Match Day Coach' as many umpires as possible and provide the necessary feedback to assist them in their development.

Seven goal umpires debuted in League during 2016, which is almost unprecedented and hasn't happened since 1988. These goal umpires were Dillon Jane, Jason Yazdani, David Hayes, Jason Tyrrell, Brendon Rac, Jamie Lamont and Nic Stace.

We had six umpires debut in Reserves – Nick Walters, Christian Cutrona, Jayden Trivanovic, Aiden Pover, Dion Boules and Ryan Wade. In addition, nine new umpires joined the WAFL panel – Maddison Lamont, Aiden Pover, Christian Cutrona, Henry Burke, Chantelle Hardeman, Ken Duggan, Dion Boules, Ryan Wade and Tegan Bartlett. These umpires have joined us with some or no experience. For the umpires who umpired for the very first time this year, their development and commitment has been outstanding.

The focus throughout the season was not about ticking the boxes and debuting umpires. The focus was about sustainability and being able to keep umpires at high levels on a regular and prolonged basis.

Other highlights included Dillon Jane being nominated and then umpiring the State 18s games in both Western Australia and Victoria. His performance through the 18s competition earned him selection to umpire before the 2016 AFL Grand Final. Jason Yazdani was selected to umpire the State 16s in Queensland. Brody Payne was selected to umpire the 2016 State Game between Western Australia and Tasmania, and he was supported by Sam Hunter as Emergency.

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING REPORT

The Strength and Conditioning team consisted of Luke Daniher, Jamison Ruscoe and the addition of Duncan Bradbury. Each team member added a variety of strengths which provided the skills and knowledge for what was a successful year from a strength and conditioning perspective.

The annual plan consisted of a tough yet effective pre-season, a fun filled team building camp, 4 testing sessions to assess the various fitness components through all phases of the year, and an annual reflection on the program's effectiveness.

This year we introduced a new testing battery looking at more specific measures of umpire performance. This provided a greater insight into each athlete's various fitness components enabling umpire's to assess both their strengths and weaknesses in comparison to their specific umpire group. Each fitness component has a particular weighting when it comes to the various umpire disciplines so it was constructive to test each of these and illustrate the importance to their role on game day. I commend the group for their understanding and positive attitude to the change of testing battery. All took to the tests with a great deal of determination and utilised the post testing information to maintain strengths and fine tune areas of weakness. This enabled them to further their individual performance and ultimately increased their ability to service the game.

The results of the testing throughout the year were very encouraging from all disciplines. Improvements of 10-58% were realised in aerobic capacity, repeat sprint ability, reaction speed, muscular power, agility, and flexibility. It was great to see these results and allow umpires going into the 2017 season with a more rounded knowledge of themselves as athletes, providing benchmarks to build on for years to come.

We as strength and conditioning coaches could not have undertaken the job we undertook throughout the 2016 season without the continued support from the coaches, physiotherapists, rehabilitation staff and the umpiring group collectively. We appreciate it immensely and look forward to continuing to improve the group moving forward into the 2017 season ahead.

Nicknamed 'Greyballs', Daniel also spoke about having to write a formal letter to the West Australian Football Commission in a desperate bid to keep his prized 'mo' and his elevation to WA's first AFL boundary umpiring panel in 1988, one year after the introduction of the West Coast Eagles.

Statham had to suit up in more than 200 games before getting his first crack at a WAFL Grand Final in 2007, the same year he won his first Montgomery Medal. He went on to feature in three more season deciders and picked up another two gongs as the competition's top field umpire.

Renowned for his laidback and carefree attitude, Statham paid tribute to his parents for their support over his 18-years career, including their collection of every Football Budget from all of his 319 games.

Shawcross, a former WANFLUA president, is the goal umpires' games record holder, turning out 353 times across more than two decades.



Shawcross's games tally includes 103 AFL appearances, with none being more special than his debut match in 1998 when he adjudicated the first 18 goals of the clash between West Coast and the Western Bulldogs.

Other special moments from the night included video highlights of each inductee during their respective careers as well as Shawcross's infamous role in a Transperth television advert and a Law & Order-style investigation into Statham's mind-boggling decision to pay a free kick to Shane Beros rather than Nic Naitanui during the 2008 WAFL Grand Final.

There is no doubt with AFL Women's upon us in 2017 that our WAFL Team will be provided with numerous opportunities and I have no doubt we are ready to embrace AFL Women's.

PRISON GAME

On Saturday 23rd July, I along with goal umpires Sam Hunter and Brody Payne, fellow boundary umpire Kirk Webster and State Umpire Manager Darryl Sinclair attended Casuarina Prison. We had all umpired the Thursday night clash between Subiaco and South Fremantle and on the Saturday morning we made the journey down the prison to help coach and pass on advice to the umpires of the inter-prison football competition.

It was intended that the date scheduled was the Grand Final, however, due to other reason this was an Elimination Final between the Bombers and the Crows. Upon arrival we had to hand over our driver's licences and were all subject to security checks as you would see at an airport.

As we walked from the registration to the oval, we all got our first looks at what a prison is actually like rather than what we have seen on TV and in movies. Surrounded by at least 10 metre concrete walls and barbed wire fencing on top of that really made this experience become real. Once we reached the oval we were introduced to 'Barry' who organised the competition and the umpires each week.

For the game, Sam and Brody stood at either end (being goal umpires of course), whilst Kirk and I got told that it would be best to stay on the grandstand (or near) side for safety reasons. All four of us worked alongside an umpire from the prisons and talked to them about the game and what they should be looking to do in certain situations. At the beginning of the game conversation was all about umpiring and footy, and how we would do things. Some of the umpires did not have any real interest in umpiring and were doing it just so they had a game so giving advice was challenging and we were not going to demand anything for obvious reasons.

Towards the end of the game we felt comfortable enough to speak about things other than footy whilst keeping our personal details to ourselves, however, many of the prisoners were quite open in sharing their story with us. This was a quite an eye-opening experience for all of us and gave us an insight into what goes on in their day to day dealings. At times you do feel for some of the prisoners inside as for example

one of the guys finished school at 17 obviously did something serious and won't be outside for another 15 years to go on top of how ever long he's been in for. At this stage you do wonder what his life would be like as he hasn't really had a life at all between finishing school and going inside. Of course we had to take their stories on face value and we had no background knowledge on anyone in there so it was a case of just listening and engaging with them as much as possible. The game itself was just footy in its purest form with everyone just playing the game for what it is and not really following any sort of structure or game plan. Umpiring wise, the standard was not too bad and by the end of the game they started to enjoy what they were doing. The goal and field umpires in particular enjoyed the game more and as a result learnt more than the boundary umpires.

Overall, this was a great experience for both life and football and something I would definitely encourage if the opportunity presents itself again in the future. We did not feel unsafe at all, the only thing that made us take a back step was when we were told to stay on the near side and in the last quarter there was a moment where a couple of players lost their cool and all the guards stood up to stop it going further. Other than that it was a game played in good spirit (only some/multiple late hits) and they were all thankful for the game and us coming along. The inmates also started to understand the rules a bit more as the guys who umpired will play next week and some of the guys who played will umpire next week. One thing I took out of this experience is football is a simple game and the fundamentals (both playing and umpiring) are quite simple. At times we can get caught up in making things difficult for ourselves and we focus on unnecessary issues. All four of us were grateful for the opportunities presented to us are thankful of Darryl and the people from the prison who made the Casuarina experience happen and work well.

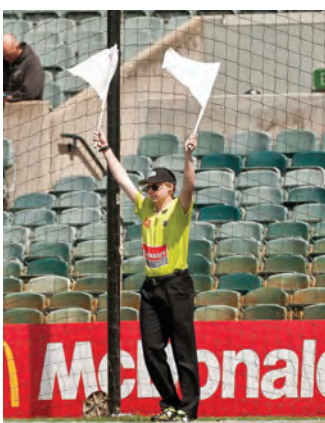

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2016

Statement of financial accounting policies

The significant policies which have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report are:

Basis of accounting

The financial report is a special purpose financial report that has been prepared for its members in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Interpretations, other authoritative announcements and the Association Handbook in a form appropriate for a sporting association.

It has been prepared on the basis of historical costs and except where stated, does not take into account changing money values or fair values of non-current assets.

The accounting policies have been consistently applied, and, except where there is a change in accounting policy, are consistent with those of the previous year.

Statement of compliance

The financial report complies with Australian Accounting Standards, which include Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (AIFRS). Compliance with AIFRS ensures that the financial report, comprising the financial statements and notes thereto, complies with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS).

(a) Revenue recognition

Revenues are recognised at fair value of the consideration received.

Membership – Membership revenue is driven through subscription fees. All membership income is recognised in the financial year in which it has been received to accurately match membership revenue with events held.

Interest – Interest Income is recognised when it is credited.

(b) Receivables

Subscriptions shall be payable in the case of an Active Member immediately on notification of appointment as an Umpire and in all other cases no later than the 31st of May each year.

Collectability of debtors is reviewed on an ongoing basis. A provision for doubtful debts is raised where doubt as to the collection exists and debts which are known to be uncollectible are written off.

(c) Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Acquisition – All acquisitions of assets (except caricatures but including the updating on all honour boards, photos and framing of posters) are recorded at the cost of acquisition, being the purchase consideration determined as at the date of acquisition, plus costs incidental to acquisition.

Caricatures – They are anticipated to have indeterminate useful life. Their service potential has not, in any material sense, been consumed during the reporting period and as such, no amount for depreciation is recognised.

Depreciation – Is calculated on a diminishing value basis using the following rates:

Honour boards, photos and posters	10%
Plant and equipment	30%
From 1 January 2016 purchases <\$2,000	100%

(d) Cash assets

Cash assets are carried at face value of the amounts deposited.

(e) Inventories

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Net realisable value is determined on the basis of each inventory line's estimated selling price.

(f) Payables

Trade creditors represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Association prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

(g) Taxes

The Association is exempt from the payment of income tax under the Income Tax Assessment Act.

Goods and services tax (GST) - Revenue, expenses, assets and liabilities are recognised inclusive of the amount of GST.

AUDIT REPORT

Scope

I have audited the Financial Records of The West Australian National Football League Umpires' Association (Inc.) ("WANFLUA") for the period 1 January 2016 to 31 December 2016. The WANFLUA is responsible for the preparation and presentation of the Financial Records and have determined that the accounting policies used are consistent with the financial reporting requirements of the Association and are appropriate for the needs of the members.

I have conducted an independent audit of the Financial Records in order to express an opinion to the members of The West Australian National Football League Umpires' Association (Inc.)

The income and expenditure statement has been prepared for distribution to members for the purpose of fulfilling the Committee's financial reporting requirements under its constitution. I disclaim any assumption of responsibility for any reliance on this report or on the income and expenditure statement to which it relates to any person other than the members, or for any purpose other than that for which it was prepared.

My audit has been conducted in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards to provide reasonable assurance as to whether the Financial Records are free of material misstatement. My procedures include examination, on a test basis, of evidence supporting the amounts and other disclosures in the Financial Records and the evaluation of accounting policies and significant accounting estimates. I recommend that the controls of these areas, particularly bar sales, be reviewed by the Committee to ensure acceptable levels of control are being followed.
