



Presidents Report

It is with great pleasure once again that I subr.it to you for your consideration my annual report.

Committeemen Peter Frusher for his efforts in producing the 1990 Yearbook, and also Phil



Secretary's Report

To those guys, the Association extends its thanks for another job well done. Thanks also to Colin Hughes whose expertise as Honorary Club Doctor was also appreciated.

Another who helped keep the ship running throughout the course of the year included Bøb Davis, who carried out the onerous task of Propertyman in his usual diligent manner. It is a credit to him after being 'dobbed in' several years ago that he still keeps coming back for more. He has the Associations best interests at heart.

Also providing valuable off-field expertise was a group of four men who gave the depth of their experiences as support to the new and not so new umpires who faced the Tribunal. To Brian Collett, Ross Capes, Ray Montgomery and Charlie Pratt I would like to express my sincerest thanks not only for generously donating your time but also for your tolerance, flexibility and reliability in circumstances out of the ordinary when an advocate was required outside of 'normal hours'. The Association also had the services of seven observers over the course of the year who were charged with the responsibility of monitoring our performances and highlighting our weaker points with the object of helping us to remove these blemishes from our game to assist us to reach higher grades. To Dale Hosking, John McKay, Terry Shorthill, Mike Johnson, Des Quilley, Trevor Rees and Reg Salis thank you for your assistance over season 1990.

Tragically, this year, the Association mourned the loss of two of its valued supporters. Past member and Grand Final umpire Len Gardner and his wife sadly passed away midway through the season, and the membership was rocked by the death of one of its converts and hard workers in Slim Somervaille. To the families of those men, the Association extends its deepest sympathy on their sad and untimely losses.

Finally in closing I would like to extend the thanks of this Association to the people who have supported the membership during the course of the year. First and foremost the financial support of the Ampol company has once again provided substantial encouragement for the recruitment and development of umpires within this State through 1990. 



Eric Hood Award







Treasurer's Report

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting the 1989-90 Accounts for your perusal.

A number of projects were undertaken by your Committee in 1989-90. The most impressive of these have been the changes to the social hall and the erection of the lights at the ground. We are in the throes of obtaining a club restricted license to cover the bar trading we do on Tuesdays and Thursdays for the coming year.

There will be investigations into building extensions onto the premises at Harold Rossiter. Indeed preliminary investigations have already been made. There may be a slight increase in the bar prices this coming year (i.e. beer will rise from \$1.50 to \$1.80) and we are doing away with the five cent piece meaning that chips and nuts will be \$0.80. Last year we kept the selling price the same as the previous year, however the cost of purchasing the merchandise had risen and all will depend on the price rises between now and the start of the season. Prices will still be more than competitive with the front bar prices at the pub and other food prices will not change. Get behind your Committee for what will be a year of consolidation for the Association.

Because of the changes in our operating structure since the Honoraria were last allocated I tender for your recommendation the following changes to the allocations. The inclusion of Bar Manager into the Honoraria whose functions will be to run the bar and do the ordering of drinks and food (with assistance of the Social Secretary) and be the licensee of the premises. The structure and fees to be as follows:

The workload on these members of the Committee was examined and the appropriate remuneration was worked out on the amount of hours that have been put in. As I have said, the changes to our operating structure have seen the Bar Manager being a job in itself which had previously been shared by the Treasurer, Social Secretary, President, Vice



President and some of the Social Committee, however, because it needs to be run in a professional manner then we will need to have one responsible person in charge.

Congratulations to our President on his big year in the AFL competition and his recent trip to Portland, Oregon for the AFL promotional game there. As you are all aware he is stepping down from the Presidency this year and is hoping that you have voted him into the Social Secretary's position. Thanks for your support over the past two years you spent as President.

Thanks also to Dom White for his efforts as Secretary this year. Dom was hoping that he could be placed on the pay-roll at the WAFC since he spent so much time there this year not only at tribunal hearings but also at the pay counter trying to get your pays in order this year.

Leith Putland did a sterling job as Bar Manager this year. He has organised the purchase of a cash register that has assisted in the handling of bar money. He has also spent countless hours behind the bar serving you and cleaning up after you. I am very pleased to see Leith reapplying for the Committee and if elected will be our Bar Manager. This position has been added to the duties of the Committee. He will be responsible for getting our club restricted license and will be the licensee. Just what he has always wanted.

Thanks must also go to Trevor Cant for his work behind the bar. Trevor has been the first behind the bar each night, no more so than the night that we advertised a topless barmaid. You could not drag Trevor away from his position. Even the Cant's Corner meeting was adjourned. Mind you he was quick to move when to his disappointment it was Leith Putland in frilly knickers that turned up. Thanks also to Trevor Pescud, who with T.C. ran our most successful function this year, the Quiz Night. You have done the Association a great service. T.C.'s contribution was acknowledged at the Presentation Night when he was awarded the Life Members Award for service over and above the call of duty to the Association. Thank you also to the ladies who attended on Thursday nights to help out with serving the food behind the bar.

In closing I would like to add that I have enjoyed taking your money so much that I shall be reapplying for the Treasurer's job. Have your cheque books at the ready.

The profitability of the bar was helped enormously by the acquisition of a cash register. This provided an accurate recording of monies taken on the night and proved a reliable accounting system to support our




weekly banking. Paul Smith was a tremendous support to me in this regard and his assistance with the weekly takings made my task that much easier.






I would like to thank all umpires for their contribution to the Association in using the bar facilities this year. It will again be my priority next year to ensure that the good service and value is maintained.







In closing I thank you one and all for your participation throughout the season. Have an enjoyable 'break', best wishes for the Festive Season and I hope to see you on the track in 1991.



Finally, I wish all umpires, wives and girlfriends a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.



Those at the top level, or striving towards it, are fully aware that there is no substitute for hard work in this area.

Greg Scroop deservedly won the most dedicated award this year and I should mention that he has been working hard generally with his training partner Peter Repper for at least the three years that I have been with the umpires. The message here is that the rewards may not be immediate but perseverance will always pay off in the long run.

Unfortunately a big effort in one year is not enough, so for all of those who have made the effort this year we move back to square one as the new season approaches. It is never enough to sit back and be pleased with the past, we must always be looking ahead and asking 'How could I be better?'.

Some suggestions for the coming pre-season, perhaps more particularly the pre-pre-season: 1. Find a training partner and plan your training sessions.

2. Determine your target times for any activities that you do.



3. On hot days train early in the morning or late at night and maintain your fluid intake.

4. Vary your training, swim on particularly hot days, or ride. Even if this means altering your training program

5. Keep in mind that frequency is a sure winner in gaining fitness rather than very hard sessions infrequently.

6. Provide at least one day at rest in your program.








Ron Buckey's look at 1990

Now that the football season is behind us, it is time to reflect on the positive things that were achieved throughout the year.

This season was a significant one in so much as many of our junior umpires from the Cadet Squad have matured and are developing into very good field umpires, whilst at the same time our senior group of umpires maintained excellent standards of umpiring throughout the season, along with a group in the middle, formerly known as 'The Pups', providing some real pressure for the senior group of umpires.

Once again the Umpiring Committee followed its policy by mainly using Cadet Squad umpires in the U/19's and once again this competition provided the necessary learning curve for the younger umpires and we were more than satisfied with the overall performance level achieved by this group in this grade. The Committee showed a great deal of confidence in taking the step to use some of these members in the final round series and it was a worthwhile exercise to give this group the experience of final round football and I am sure that they will be better umpires next season for the experience which they have gained.

Overall the umpiring performances in the State Football League have been quite outstanding with very little criticism being levelled at a very dedicated group of people and it is to each and everyone of the umpires to take credit for their own personal achievements for the work and time they have put into maintaining the highest level of fitness ever seen in this State.

Once again we were fortunate enough to have six members selected for the AFL Field Umpires Squad with three of these people participating this season at AFL level. We were all delighted to see the results of your President, Mike Ball, achieving a total of twenty AFL games, including being the first WA umpire to participate in an AFL Final. In addition Mike umpired the State of Origin game at the WACA ground this year. Truly an outstanding performance from a very experienced umpire. In addition we were also delighted to see the emergence of Greg Scroop into the ranks to umpire the last three home and away games and on those performances we are expecting Greg to make a big contribution in 1991 in the senior Grant Vernon was our other ranks. representative who gave some very pleasing performances and we certainly hope that Grant will be able to further his career at this level.



Our participation in the Sunday Football League Colts competition proved to be very demanding on umpiring and also the people responsible for the selection process. It was disappointing to once again learn that we would not be able to umpire in the Grand Final for this competition and it almost appeared that we would not be able to umpire in any lead up finals, however after some discussion, the Sunday Football League allowed our panel to participate and it was to their credit that these performances were of the highest standard. A decision has been taken by the Umpiring Committee not to partake in this competition next sea son due to a number of factors, one of these being the lack of discipline displayed in this competition. It has proven to be more than a handful for some of our younger members to handle a young, volatile and excited group of footballers at this level.

The other aspect that I would like to touch upon is the role of the umpires coach in the State Football League and the AFL's inability to come to terms with the extremely urgent need for a Director of Umpiring in this State. To operate the coaching and the development jobs in a part time capacity is very demanding and there are never enough hours to be able to do the job properly. I see it as the Associations top priority to get the parties to agree on the terms and conditions and to appoint the most suitable person to this job. This means that there is a need for a qualified person with an umpiring background to fulfil this role. The need for proper coaching feedback and records are just not being delivered in the way that I would like to see and therefore I urge all those concerned to put umpiring first instead of what appears to be some perceived interference from outside organisations. Umpiring across Australia is being coached in one direction and therefore the tears of this State's Football League are baseless.

To the boundary umpires and Barry McKenzie in particular, it was a very pleasing season for all and it became very difficult to select the top boundary umpires when so many were achieving very high standards. I am pleased to see the group that Barry has assembled and the way the younger group have shown excellent progress.

To the other very important group who carry out a difficult job in umpiring, the goal umpires, I would like to thank them all for a great season. The standard achieved is extremely high and full credit should go to Neville Lewis in attaining these results. I would also like to recognise the role of Roy Ferguson who assisted Neville in observing and coaching the goal umpires. His advice and experience from the VFL was certainly a bonus for goal umpiring and I am sure that there were some very useful hints and advice tendered to all who were prepared to listen.

To Kevin Castensen, I wish to pass on my special thanks for another excellent job completed with our Development Squad. Nobody would really appreciate the work that Kevin gave to his job and the many hours that were spent in his endeavours to promote our younger umpires. Kevin can reflect back on the magnificent job that he has completed and can look forward to seeing the future progress of the umpires who have passed through this squad. We certainly hope that Kevin will be around in this same capacity or similar next season as he will be very difficult to replace.

Special tribute should be paid to Clint Roberts for the level of fitness achieved by our panel, particularly over the pre-season build up. Truly and outstanding year from a fitness point of view. Clint appears to be a very popular person with the group and is able to achieve the results where others have failed. We look forward to Clint continuing in this role.

To the Umpiring Committee, the Chairman John Nagle, Terry Nicholls and Kevin Castensen, I would like to pass on my thanks for the contribution you made throughout the season. It is never easy to select umpires but each gave a positive contribution to select the best umpire appropriate for the grade and game. Our observing group this season proved again to be an extremely valuable part of the selection process, by providing the necessary evaluation of performances and general feedback to the umpires. I certainly hope that we can retain this group who proved to be a very valuable part of umpiring.

To the support staff, Warren, Ray, Roy and Arthur, who provided the necessary treatment for injuries, I would like to pass on my special thanks. We will certainly need to retain their valuable services in the future. I was also delighted to see a former leading umpire, President and Life Member of the Association, return to the fold in the role of trainer. I am sure the support and advice that Ray Whitfield was able to offer was invaluable to all who wished to improve. Many thanks to all our trainers.

To our stalwart and secretary, Des Quilley, a very special thanks for the excellent work throughout the season. Des never finds any job too big when it comes to umpiring, he certainly enjoys his involvement, and receives a great deal of pleasure from seeing umpires achieving excellent results. Many thanks Des.

Finally I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those with whom I have been associated throughout the season. Unfortunately, with my new job, I was unable to dedicate more time to umpiring and this is why I urge everyone to ensure that they put their weight behind a permanent Director of Umpiring being appointed in this State.

I wish to assure everyone that the standards achieved by each and every umpire this season far outweighs any previous year and each umpire should take credit for the results achieved. The break between seasons becomes even shorter and it will not be long before we are back into full pre-season training. I certainly hope that everyone maintains some degree of fitness over this break and returns with the same degree of enthusiasm and vigour for the 1991 season.

I wish you, your wives, families and girlfriends all the best during the break, have a happy Festive Season and I hope you achieve all that you desire for the 1991 season.




Stirrers Award


Vale 'Slim' Somervaille
