Presidents's Report

I extend a further thank you to the members of the WANFLUA Executive: Ashley Coster, Alex Martin and Justin Power, together with our Social Secretary, David Thatcher, for the enormous amount of time, passion and effort they have put in over the past year to make a positive and lasting contribution to the WANFLUA.

The 2014 year saw a significant changeover in personnel of the WANFLUA Management Committee. Steven Gaensler (President), Travis Norton (Treasurer) and Mathew Dodgson (Secretary) all retiring their positions from the WANFLUA Executive and Rob McCaw, Kendell Ball, Ryan Shelton and Tim Lefroy also retiring their positions from the general committee.

The work of the previous Executive over many years has seen the WANFLUA grow into the fantastic organisation that it is today. On behalf of the current committee and all members, thank you to all the vacating committee members for their contribution to this association. A special mention and thank you must go to Kendell Ball and Steven Gaensler, who both have made astronomical contributions to the WANFLUA over the past decade in their respective roles.

Edge Fitness, headed up by Ryan Kukura, joined the WANFLUA as our platinum sponsor for 2014. Edge Fitness (www.edgefitness.com.au) provides a range of personal and group training experiences along with a developing cheerleading program. The expertise of Ryan and the team at Edge Fitness has proved highly beneficial for a number of our members and we look forward to their support and sponsorship continuing into 2015. The WANFLUA wouldn't be able to deliver the benefits to members that it currently does without the contributions of these sponsors. We also hope that these partnerships with the WANFLUA will continue to be mutually beneficial, so I urge all of our members to support our sponsors wherever possible.

As part of the annual Memorandum of Understanding discussions with the West Australian Football Commission (WAFC), the executive was able to secure space on all umpires match day uniforms and goal umpires hats for our platinum sponsor to display their logos. This was an important step for our association to increase the value and marketing opportunities that we can provide our sponsors.

Further to securing advertising space on the match day uniform worn by all umpires, the executive was also able to secure the following significant results from the 2015 Memorandum of Understanding discussions:

- Match payments for all official WAFL pre-season matches;
- An increase in home and away, finals and grand final match payments; and
- Increased WAFC funding of training uniforms.

As part of the transition into their new roles, the Executive spent significant time in 2014 familiarising themselves with the day to day running of the WANFLUA, including surveying all current running members. A comprehensive review of the trading operations of the WANFLUA identified the significant growth experienced by the WANFLUA over the past years, due in part to the size and profile of the WANFLUA social calendar.

The work of David Thatcher and the Management Committee, together with added investment in providing additional entertainment at each social event, led to another successful, fun-filled social calendar in 2014.

The review of the WANFLUA operations highlighted areas for the committee to explore in order to become a more efficiently run organisation. These opportunities, some of which were implemented in 2014 and some which will be explored and implemented in 2015, are:

- The setting of an annual budget prior to the commencement of each financial year;
- The creation of job portfolios for general committee members;
- The upgrade and purchase of new accounting software;
- The purchase of online storage to centralise all the records of the WANFLUA and move towards being a paperless organisation;
- Changes being made to the constitution regarding liquor licencing, electronic banking and communication with members.

The involvement of our life members in the running of our association and in attending our social functions is something which is extremely valued by our committee. The WANFLUA is excited to survey its life members in 2015 to research and implement means and ways of increasing life member satisfaction and involvement with all facets of the WANFLUA.

The WANFLUA would be unable to run its day to day operations without the funding and support of the WAFC. Based on the current structure of the WANFLUA, this funding and support is essential. In 2014 the WANFLUA and WAFC worked closely together on a number of matters, including the successful 2014 Memorandum of Understanding as discussed above.

I would like to thank the WAFC for the professional manner in which they have conducted themselves throughout 2014. This has resulted in the ability of the WAFC and the WANFLUA to come to agreeable outcomes, which are ultimately in the best interests of our members and umpiring in the state of Western Australia.

The workload of the WANFLUA is extremely onerous and is only increasing with the ever increasing social calendar, redevelopment of our training base and the expected governance of an organisation with a growing turnover. The WANFLUA's ability to provide services for its members is solely reliant on the generosity and contribution of a number of volunteers: It is simply too much work for one or two people to do. I would therefore like to thank every single volunteer who has given their time to positively contribute to a successful 2014 for the WANFLUA.

Moving forward into 2015, even more help is required. Even if your contribution is not in an official capacity, please know that your contribution will be extremely appreciated. I encourage all members to consider where you can contribute to this association and if possible, approach any member of our committee to offer up your assistance.

I would like to thank all the members for entrusting me in the role of WANFLUA President in 2014 and look forward to continue working with all members to further improve their experiences as a member of the WANFLUA.

State Field Umpires Coach

When I retired from umpiring after a 2013 season lost to a combination of injury, work and changed personal circumstances, coaching the WAFL field umpires was probably not at the top of my list of things to do in 2014. However, when the job became vacant I gave it serious thought because the WAFL competition means a great deal to me and especially the role of umpiring in that competition. I had some very firm views about the way the game should be umpired, and ultimately the chance to implement and test those views with a squad long on talent but short on experience was one too good to pass up.

When I was interviewed for the position I expressed that I would implement a philosophy that had umpires paying obvious warranted free kicks, bouncing the ball straight, and otherwise staying out of the way. I believed it was critical to get our list to understand their proper role in the competition -- that while our job is important and valued, it is done best when we are not noticed. I wanted us to be strong on accountability, but also on transparency, and this cut both ways. I thought it was important that we explain this philosophy to the clubs, and that we reinforce internally that we are in the service business: we are paid to meet the expectations of the participants, the fans, and the football community more broadly.

With those overarching principles laid down, I made a commitment to my umpires that my coaching philosophy would be simple, consistent, honest and transparent -- and I asked that this commitment be a two way street. For as long I was coach we would apply

a consistent interpretation to free kicks, demand high quality execution of skills and apply consistent standards to the group from top to bottom. I made a commitment to umpires that I and the coaches would be honest with them at all times, and asked that they return the same respect. I believe this foundational work was critical to how our season unfolded.

With no disrespect at all to the men who coached me, I always believed that the enemy of consistency was uncertainty. I also watched with some bemusement at a coaching approach that withheld information about umpires' performances from them, rather than deliver that feedback to them directly and constructively. Whilst I do not claim to be perfect in this regard and no doubt umpires will have differing opinions, I feel that umpires knew where they stood, and if they did not know, they could come and ask. There was also no uncertainty about what success looked like, or what umpires were required to deliver to reach their team and individual goals.

As the season progressed I was delighted with the buy in I received from the umpiring group. To Kyle Sinclair, your work in preparing coaching vision was flawless and I thank you for doing a time-consuming job with no fuss.

I learned an awful lot from my first year coaching this group and I thank the field umpires for their support and respect. Of course we want to develop good umpires but what was most gratifying was investing in good people. The group has grown immeasurably in 2014 and laid a strong foundation for 2015 and beyond.

Pre Season *through the eyes of Tony Raudino*

An invitation was extended to me to join preseason with the WAFL umpires, an elite group of runners: determined, dedicated, and motivated with a no excuse policy. The reputation of the WAFL umpires is admired by all other umpiring fraternities in the state, and their training programs which have filtered out to the country leagues leave regions in awe of a “light” Tuesday session.

It had been a long time since I had done a preseason that did not involve a heavy post-training drinking session. My last real preseason involved 10 x 1 km sprints on 3:30 and I didn’t know how I would cope with that sort of running 15 years on. The first session down at EJ was approached with excitement, anxiety and trepidation. We all set off for a run and a few stretches and I was done, cooked, blown up, exhausted, and finished! I was looking for the showers, mentally patting myself on the back for making it through the first session, when someone mentioned 3 sets of 10 x 350’s! Crikey Moses – then that run was just a warm up! It was going to be tough.

I remember having hands on knees, leaning over to gasp for breath, and noticing everyone down there looked as if they were state runners: and, as it turns out, some are. I needed to get a grip on what we were going to be doing week in week out to mentally prepare. I approached a few old heads at training like Pitch, Smithy, Deano and Chippy. “Expect the usual,” they said with a shrug of the shoulders. “Nothing fancy, just getting the team back into shape.” The usual? What the bloody hell is “the usual”? For me the usual was a phone call from a coach saying “I’ll buy you a couple of beers if you do a scratchy for us.” I figured that wasn’t going to happen.

A couple of weeks in and it was all starting to come together. All the training runs were aimed at getting us fit and fast. The most enjoyable runs, for me, were the longer ones around the river where we didn’t stop we just ran hard, cruised, ran hard. On the fartlek type runs, I found that I could cope much better than the short sharp stuff. Maybe I was getting old, too old for this, too old for racing 20 year olds. Then again, maybe I could keep up with them, and would never know if I gave up now.

If I did give up, I would never have played in the winning cricket team in a match that is taken very seriously. I know Goose and Hunty may not agree but Ryno is one of the most competitive people down there and I imagine he lay awake at night with the coach’s board determining who would play well in what position, the best moves, tactics and approaches he could use while captaining his preseason team.

On and off the track, the inclusiveness of the group made the hardest sessions easy. Everyone has their own strengths and it makes training interesting. There are people who love the “Gecko” (freaks), people who love the challenge of burpees (crazies), and everyone in-between. What brings everyone together is the fact we are a team, we train as one, we play as one and we believe we are one.

Four weeks into the preseason the training went up a notch. Specific training for each discipline and I would be lying if I didn’t look over to Reuben doing goal specific training and think “Maybe I should have a go at goals!” Then I would look over at Parry and think, “Field! I should have a crack at that, it doesn’t look like enough of a challenge, no wonder he’s had so many come backs!” But I just put my head down and ran as hard as I could to always finish well behind Junior and Lefroy.

The crazy thing is, for all the aches and pains, the burning legs, the hot afternoons, the cramping, burning eyes from sweat, pain from core exercisers, blisters and sore feet, I couldn’t wait for Tuesday and Thursday to roll around and push myself that bit harder; because it is only when you have taken yourself beyond what you thought was possible that you realise impossible is just a word.

favourite John Beaton aphorisms, such as: "When bouncing, we must back the ute up into the garage."

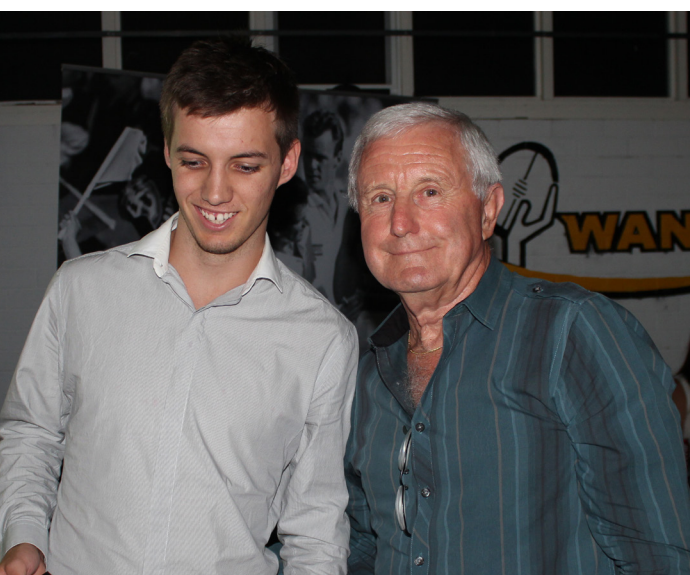
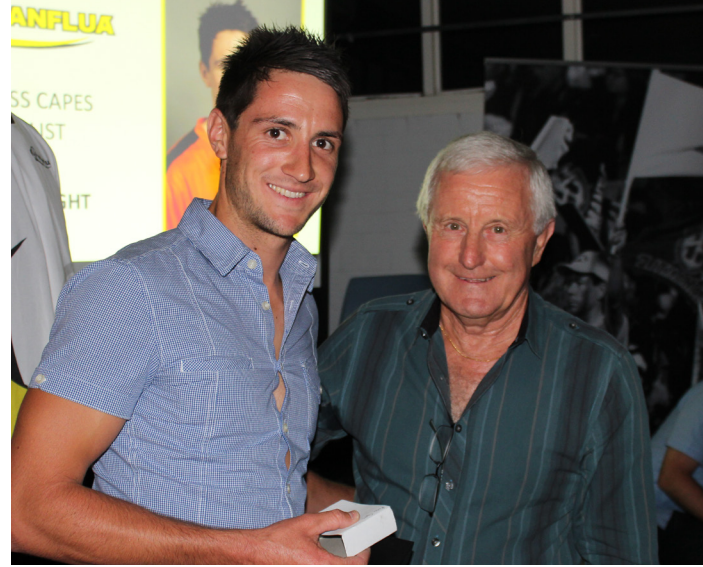

Hall of Fame

Boundary umpiring great Jamie Giles and legendary flagwaver Ray Hartland have become the latest inductees into the prestigious WANFLUA Hall of Fame.

Giles and Hartland are the 58th and 59th members to be inducted since the Hall of Fame was established in 1995. The pair were formally inducted into the Hall of Fame in front of family and friends and a host of current and former umpires, including several Hall of Fame members, at a function at Ernest Johnson Oval in early July.

Giles is considered one of the modern day boundary umpiring greats, having umpired 278 league matches, including a record-equalling 203 matches at AFL level.

The pinnacle of his decorated career was twice reaching an AFL Preliminary Final in 2006 and 2009 and went agonisingly close to going one step further on both occasions.

A talented junior footballer but a self-confessed “non-athlete”, Giles joined the WANFLUA in 1995 and umpired several matches alongside former AFL boundary umpires Greg Smith and Alan Zanich.

“He went toe-to-toe with some of the premium runners in the country and he did so consistently,” Zanich said. “He did multiple preliminary finals and ended up retiring at the back end of a preliminary final, so he basically walked away from guaranteed finals action.”

Smith said Giles’s consistent performance in AFL finals from year to year helped defined his time as a boundary umpire at the elite level.

“He wouldn’t get just one final and that’s it,” Smith said. “He would get a second final and a third final and that obviously depicts his ability as an umpire, but a consistent umpire at the top level.”

Giles, who also umpired the 1998 WAFL Grand Final

before his elevation to the AFL panel, was welcomed into the Hall of Fame by his long-time boundary colleague and 2009 inductee George Pampacos.

“Jamie’s biggest asset was that he left everything out on the footy field,” Pampacos said. “He gave everything he could to run a good game. Jamie also made sure he got his two mates through the game as well.”

Hartland umpired 130 league matches, including two WAFL grand finals in 1971 and 1973 with Brian Collett and John McKay respectively.

Hall of Fame member Roy Becker said Hartland’s ability to always remain focused and in position for a score were the standout attributes of his games.

“He was a pretty good umpire,” Becker said. “Concentration is the biggest thing in goal umpiring because you’re standing there by yourself all day virtually and it’s pretty hard to concentrate for the whole time.” WANFLUA great Barry Mackenzie said while Hartland was a picture was composure on the field, he never appeared calm until the first ball was bounced.

“Once the game started he was alright, but before we went out he was always jiggling around and moving around, waiting for the game to start,” Mackenzie said. “Meanwhile, his mate Brian Collett, well he was as cool as a cucumber.”

Hartland’s 12-year career behind the goals also included four state matches, including the 1979 State Carnival, before he retired his flags in 1981. The WANFLUA congratulates Jamie Giles and Ray Hartland on their inductions into the Hall of Fame.

Having trained with Luke for the best part of a decade, I can hand on heart say that I have never seen a person so diligent and professional when it came to rehabilitation and fighting back from injury.

I urge any umpire within our ranks to tap into Luke's ability in this area, if you ever find yourself having a frustration with injury.

Now physically back better than ever, Luke has been umpiring at the peak of his powers being ranked in the AFL Umpires top 16 for the past 3 seasons – a significant achievement in itself.

Luke, whilst I am biased as I have been mates with you for 15-plus years, I commend and congratulate you on your wonderful milestone and I am sure all members will agree it is a super effort.

Footnote: We were very fortunate to secure the legend of footy commentary Dennis Cometti to attend Luke's 300th game presentation night. Dennis had a close coaching association with Luke's dad Clinton, so it was great to have them there too. (I am still paying he appearance fee off as we speak!!)

Nathan Doig *an inside to this legend!*

Nathan Doig is now a 3 time AFL grand final umpire and a member of the Team of the Decade of the WANFLUA. Although those of you who know Nathan, are aware that he keeps to himself and is a quiet leader that proves himself time and time again on the track and on the field.

Nathan a little off topic but you have a lot of tattoos and every preseason we notice new ones. Do your tattoos have any particular meaning and do you have that represent your time in football so far?

They all have a significant meaning but no there is none in relation to footy.

Which is your favourite?

They all are, they all tell a story but if I had to choose a favourite it would have to be my next one. It's always my next one.

Ok lets get onto the topic of football. How did you viewed umpiring after your decision to walk away from footy in 2012 to work with John Steffensen at the Olympics?

I always knew I wanted to come back, I always knew that when I left, whether it be in the WAFL or whether they gave me another chance in the AFL I would always come back.

And it wouldn't have bothered you being a WAFL umpire only?

No, its not that I love the challenge that footy brings, I enjoy what I do down there.

How will life change now that you are about to become a dad?

Well I still have seven and a half weeks to go. I don't know. It's not real yet, although by the time people read this article it will be. We are having a Boy and we have a name but other than that only time will tell.

You have done three grand finals. Last years Hawthorn V. Sydney was the most one sided. How did that compare to other ones?

Hardest. It was a hard game, it was a hot day and there was a lot of goals scored. Even though it was one sided and Sydney didn't score a lot it wasn't as if they didn't take it into their forward line. Obviously Hawthorn had the scoreboard pressure though. I mean they were all hard but this one was by far the hardest. I know all four boys walked off the end of the game pretty exhausted.

Was that the hardest game you have ever done?

Its up there yeah.

What was the hardest game you have ever ran?

My first AFL game, I thought I could never be good enough after waking off after that one. It was round 4, 2005, WCE v. Western Bulldogs, 35 goal game. It was the game Chris Judd kicked the goal of the year. I threw it in, Cox tapped it to him, Judd span out of the pack and bang. I think I forgot what I was doing as after it went through for a goal I realised I need o get down there to run it back (old 3 umpire system, 2 on ground 1 switching off bench)

The grand final 'is just another game' in your words and you're not treating it differently to any other game but obviously it is different to other games due to the hype of it all, how does this effect your preparation?

I have to tell my wife not to get so caught up in it. She, not gets annoying but my wife gets more excited than I do and I still have a job to do. At the end of the day you are still out here doing what you have done countless times before, the rules don't change suddenly, it's still 18v18 on the ground.

What it like being an umpire at the AFL pre Grand Final dinner at the MCG?

My wife gets to get dressed up every year which is nice for her.

We get given our Grand Final shirts, they each have the Grand Final logo on them and they are 3 shirts that I have kept. I don't keep a lot of umpiring stuff, I don't really hold a lot of stuff really close to me be in life or in umpiring but yeah they are three things I've kept, and are sitting in a wardrobe.

You mentioned that this was the hardest Grand Final you have done to date. How did that effect your preparation for the half and full iron man you completed in the off season and what is your training schedule?

I try to train every day, seven days a week. The day after a game is my recovery run. I couldn't run after this Grand Final for about a week due to cramping in my hamstring. I started training for my iron man in July doing bits and pieces but as I couldn't run after my GF I jumped on the bike and I swam a bit, sort of when, I wasn't getting tattoos. And about a week after I started training properly.

And how did you find that with preseason training?

Well it's running. Doing the iron man gave me a good base but it took away a lot of speed I had. So I found once I completed the iron man I had to go back into some speed stuff.

You said you train seven days a week, in regards to iron man how many hours was that as there is three elements to the iron man?

A lot, maybe 20 hours a week. Some of them were double days/ some triple (stupidly). So I would ride or run in the morning and swim in the evening.

You have been umpiring since 2002, done over 7 senior games. What is your advice for career longevity in umpiring?

I stopped letting it effect me during the week. Once I stopped letting it affect me during the week I got my first Grand Final in 2011. The AFL especially is with you throughout the week, the media, the footage, the interviews, the coaches, and the scrutiny. Once I learned to distance myself from it I was able to relax and I guess achieve more.

At the end of every season there is a Grand Final that every team strives to be a part of and every umpire hopes to officiate. How do you view finals football?

Finals football should not define your season. The definition should be "have you done all you can to make it a successful season?" If someone beats you, well shit, they are just better than you. People see failure as a bad thing but it's not. In 2010 I did a preliminary final with Alan Zanich. Neither of us proceed into the Grand Final. I had to ask myself had I done all I could have? This wasn't just on the track although that is a huge part of it, it was also learning, as mentioned about, to distance myself from it. Football is subjective, it's not a race where it's black and white and people finish first, second and third. It's based on some ones opinion. In the end you have to be happy with what you did and honest with yourself.

Nathan you have a very different view to umpiring then most people. Who would you say influenced you the most in your career?

I could name a lot that have influenced me, Ben Brown, Sean Fairfoul, Peter Frusher, Michael Pampacos, Greg Smith, George Pampacos, Jamie Giles, Z, Jace Collingridge, Brett Dalglish, Adam Bastick, Cal Brown but if I had to choose my most influential it would have to be Ben Brown. He brought me down to umpiring. Drove me many nights to training (explained rules, answered questions and was a great runner) He was a 5 time WAFL grand final umpire and an AFL umpire.

On the track who pushes you the most?

Jace Collingridge when he is fit. No all the AFL boys push me one way or another; Adam Bastick, Cal Brown, Brett Dags, and then there are a few young up and comers that can really run like Junior (Josh Garrett). Once I got back on the AFL list I needed to prove to myself that 2011 wasn't a fluke that I could do it again that it can be done from here (as Dan Gooch was able to show me) for all the younger guys. I just want to keep improving myself. Can I still get better? That pushes me a lot also to this day.

Do you think offer something to the umpiring group?

Ummmm I don't know. You would have to ask them that.



Greg's 450th Game

Greg Smith is used to breaking records, and he has done this with every league appointment for many years. However Round 23 between Subiaco and East Fremantle at Medibank Stadium will be remembered for the particular milestone of 450 games.

The following week it was made very clear that Greg is not only a 450 game umpire, but still one of the best on our panel when he was appointed to run in the first week of finals bringing the games record to 451.

While Greg's milestone is an incredible feat, I believe what should also be recognised is his commitment to WAFL football since returning from the AFL ranks in 2005. If you include 2005, where Greg umpired in the WAFL for much of the year and also umpired the 2005 WAFL Grand Final, he has contributed 10 years since his return, to servicing our game, passing on his experience to our umpiring panel and leading by example both at training and on game day.

For Michael Washbourne, and myself it was an honour to be able to run in Greg's 450th and on behalf of the umpiring group we would like to pass on our congratulations on achieving this milestone.

Life Member Inductees

Beau Wardman

In his six years on the WANFLUA committee, Beau's work for the association was indefatigable. He served in an office-bearing role in each of those years, with three years as Secretary and three successful years as President. In these roles, Beau frequently went above and beyond the usual duties of the position.

In the role of President, Beau's professionalism drove the committee, the WANFLUA and the umpiring group to new levels. To list but a few, Beau's significant achievements as President included: securing increased sponsorship for the association; improving training uniforms; and fostering strong relationships with community stakeholders at Ernest Johnson Reserve, as well as assisting to improve and maintain these facilities. Beau also contributed greatly to the social side of the association. This included the introduction of new events, reformatting of the existing ones, and donations of his own time, and often, his own resources, into the smooth running of functions.

Dave O'Neill

Dave joined the WAFL as a field umpire in 2002, and it did not take long for him to become an influential member of the WANFLUA both on and off the field.

In 2005, Dave became Secretary of the Association. He would hold this position for the next four years, becoming only the fifth person to do so. Dave's commitment to his Secretarial duties was outstanding, and he was passionate about increasing the involvement of both running and life members. To this end, he successfully updated the contact list and improved the means of contacting life members. Dave also was responsible for a number of improvements beyond his role of secretary, such as the painting of the Hall of Fame and photo walls at Ernest Johnson. Dave was also responsible for revolutionizing the format of WANFLUA functions, including introducing video montages to Hall of Fame presentations. This involved a significant contribution of his own time.

Dave was also heavily involved in the production of the Yearbook for a number of years. For this, and other contributions, he was awarded the John McKay Life Member's Trophy in 2007.

His on-field achievements are also very much worthy of recognition. Beau umpired 100 League matches including 3 finals, umpired several Reserves Grand Finals and was appointed as the League Grand Final emergency umpire in his final season. Being able to achieve such on-field success while dedicating so much time to the Association is testament to his commitment and dedication.

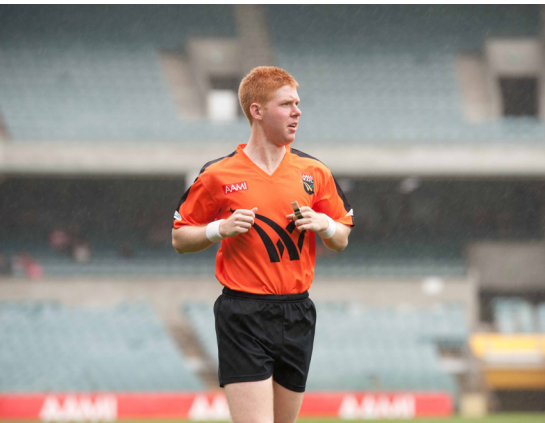
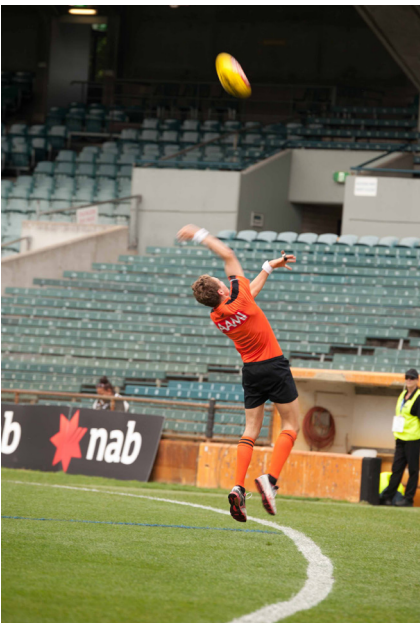

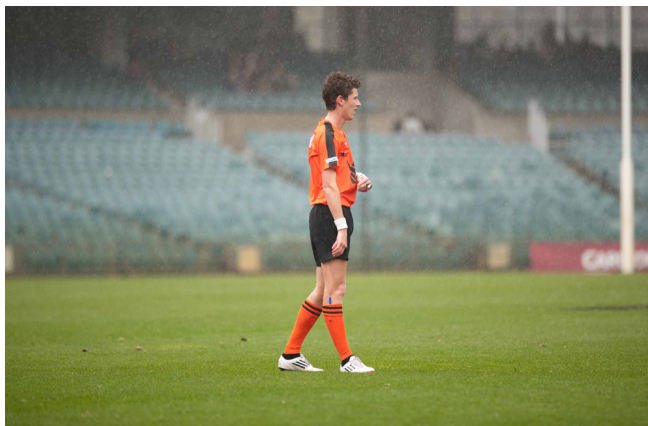

1 Statement of significant accounting policies

The significant policies which have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report are:

Basis of accounting

The financial report is a special purpose financial report that has been prepared for its members in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Interpretations, other authoritative announcements and the Association Handbook in a form appropriate for a sporting association.

It has been prepared on the basis of historical costs and except where stated, does not take into account changing money values or fair values of non-current assets.

The accounting policies have been consistently applied, and, except where there is a change in accounting policy, are consistent with those of the previous year.

Statement of compliance

The financial report complies with Australian Accounting Standards, which include Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (AIFRS). Compliance with AIFRS ensures that the financial report, comprising the financial statements and notes thereto, complies with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS).

(a) Revenue recognition

Revenues are recognised at fair value of the consideration received.

Membership – Membership revenue is driven through subscription fees. All membership income is recognised in the financial year in which it has been received to accurately match membership revenue with events held.

Interest – Interest income is recognised when it is credited.

(b) Receivables

Subscriptions shall be payable in the case of an Active Member immediately on notification of appointment as an Umpire and in all other cases no later than the 31st of May each year.

Collectability of debtors is reviewed on an ongoing basis. A provision for doubtful debts is raised where doubt as to the collection exists and debts which are known to be uncollectible are written off.

(c) Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Acquisition – All acquisitions of assets (except caricatures but including the updating on all honour boards, photos and framing of posters) are recorded at the cost of acquisition, being the purchase consideration determined as at the date of acquisition, plus costs incidental to acquisition.

Caricatures - They are anticipated to have indeterminate useful life. Their service potential has not, in any material sense, been consumed during the reporting period and as such, no amount for depreciation is recognised.

Depreciation - Is calculated on a diminishing value basis using the following rates:

Honour boards, photos and posters	10%
Plant and equipment	30%

(d) Cash assets

Cash assets are carried at face value of the amounts deposited.

(e) Inventories

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Net realisable value is determined on the basis of each inventory line's estimated selling price.

(f) Payables

Trade creditors represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Association prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

(g) Taxes

The Association is exempt from the payment of income tax under the Income Tax Assessment Act.

Goods and services tax (GST) - Revenue, expenses, assets and liabilities are recognised inclusive of the amount of GST.

AUDIT REPORT

The The Members of The West Australian National Football

League Umpires' Association (Inc.)

Scope

I have audited the Financial Records of The West Australian National Football League Umpires' Association (Inc.) ("WANFLUA") for the period 1 January 2014 to 31 December 2014. The WANFLUA is responsible for the preparation and presentation of the Financial Records and have determined that the accounting policies used are consistent with the financial reporting requirements of the Association and are appropriate for the needs of the members.

I have conducted an independent audit of the Financial Records in order to express an opinion to the members of The West Australian National Football League Umpires' Association (Inc.)

The income and expenditure statement has been prepared for distribution to members for the purpose of fulfilling the Committee's financial reporting requirements under its constitution. I disclaim any assumption of responsibility for any reliance on this report or on the income and expenditure statement to which it relates to any person other than the members, or for any purpose other than that for which it was prepared.

My audit has been conducted in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards to provide reasonable assurance as to whether the Financial Records are free of material misstatement. My procedures include examination, on a test basis, of evidence supporting the amounts and other disclosures in the Financial Records and the evaluation of accounting policies and significant accounting estimates. These procedures have been undertaken to form an opinion as to whether, in all material respects, the Financial Records are presented fairly in accordance with Accounting Standards and other mandatory professional reporting requirements in Australia, the Association Incorporation Act (WA) and the WANFLUA's Constitution so as to present a view which is consistent with my understanding of its financial position and the result of its operation and its cash flows.

The audit opinion expressed in this report has been formed on the above basis.

As is common for organisations of this type it is not practical for the WANFLUA to maintain an effective system of internal control over subscriptions, functions, bar sales and other activities until their initial entry in the accounting records. Accordingly, my audit in relation to subscriptions, functions, bar sales and other activities was limited to the amounts recorded.

AUDIT OPINION

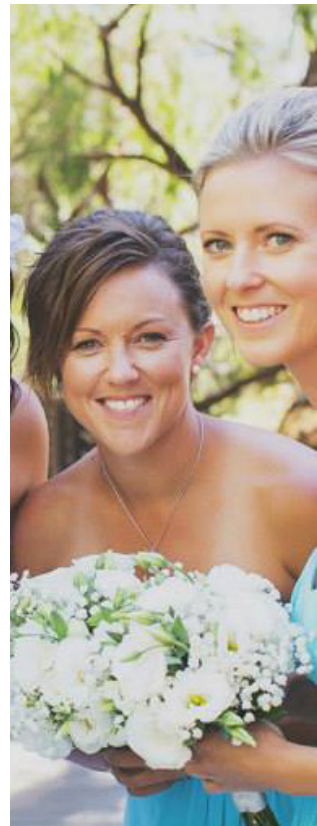
