## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

*McLane Edinger*

It was an honour and a privilege to once again be elected by as WANFLUA president for season 2019 and while I will be stepping down from the role after only two years in the "hot seat", I am extremely proud of the many things achieved by this fantastic association in that short period of time.

Firstly, I want to thank both the running and life members for their support and ongoing commitment to keeping the longstanding traditions of the WANFLUA alive. Few associations have 67 years of proud history to look back on and it is something we as the current group of umpires must continue to preserve for many more years to come.

Our running members can take great comfort knowing we enter the 2020 season with the long-awaited MOU finally signed for the next two years and we thank David Crute, Dean Margetts and Scott Baker from the WAFC for the constructive manner in which they have engaged with us over the finalisation of these crucial documents. I am very happy to say the WANFLUA has successfully negotiated for increased entitlements and contributions, including (but not limited to) an extra table for umpires at the Sandover Medal count and the WAFC agreeing to cover the costs for our medical trainers to attend the Grand Final Dinner Dance.

One item that does remain outstanding is a completed Umpire Policy and Procedures manual which has not been issued by the WAFC for the last two seasons. While we understand some of the circumstances around why its release has been delayed due to high staff turnover within the WAFC, the WANFLUA believes it is imperative for our running members to have clear guidelines around what is required of them, including policies around use of social media, and we will continue to pursue this as a matter of urgency until it has been distributed to the group.

Undoubtedly the highlight of 2019 was the return of the prestigious WANFLUA Hall of Fame in late July. After a hiatus in 2018 and being held off-site for the preceding three years, the "red carpet" event returned to Ernest Johnson Oval and served as the unveiling of the newly minted Brett Rosebury Room inside the John McGrath Pavilion for many past umpires and life members. We were also privileged to have Channel 7 WAFL commentator Mark Readings as our MC for the



evening and he did an exceptional job as we inducted Stuart Parry, Greg Smith and Adam Peacock into the Hall of Fame. Given the overwhelming success of the event, I believe we have set the very bar high for future Hall of Fame inductions.

Another significant step for the WANFLUA was the creation and adoption of our new constitution. The new constitution modernises and clarifies many of the association's rules, procedures and processes whilst maintaining the longstanding principles and governance underpinning the WANFLUA. There is no doubt that future committees will be far better placed to maintain the efficient and effective running of the association by reason of the new constitution.

The WANFLUA was fortunate to once again be awarded the horse guarding contract by Racing and Wagering WA and I would very much like to thank those members who volunteered their time to assist with this exercise. As has been the case for the past five years, the funds raised help maintain the association's very strong financial position and ensure membership fees remain unchanged for the coming season. The funds also allow us to significantly subsidise the many events on the WANFLUA social calendar and continue to make capital purchases. Again, I strongly urge members to volunteer their time to assist the RWWA with horse guarding duties so the WANFLUA can retain the full financial benefits of this contract and also offer

suggestions as to how we can spend some of these funds in a sustainable way.

I would personally like to extend a special thank you to WANFLUA Vice-President David Thatcher for taking over the management of RWWA appointments from Ash Coster. David will also be stepping up as WANFLUA President for the 2020 season and I could not think of a better person to fill the role. It was only a few years ago "Thatch" indicated he was keen for a break from the Committee after many fine years as our Social Secretary. To have then put his hand up as Vice-President for the last two years and now taking on the presidency says a lot about his dedication to the group and what he hopes to achieve for you as members of the WANFLUA.

My time as President would have been incredibly challenging if not for the unrivalled support of people such as David but in particular Alex Martin and Ben Laycock. Like David, Alex and Ben were set to stand down as Secretary and Treasurer respectively in 2018 but agreed to stay on for another year to assist with a smooth transition of the WANFLUA Executive. As fate would have it, both Alex and Ben served another year in 2019 and I want to again personally thank them for their longstanding contributions and commitments in two very important roles for the association at a time when few others were willing to put their hands up. Alex has been the Secretary since 2014 and can now happily retire as a Life Member following 15 years of distinguished service. Ben also joined the WANFLUA in 2014 as a general committee member and has been Treasurer since 2016. Both Alex and Ben went above and beyond in their roles and their legacies will certainly not be lost on those who follow.

I am also pleased to say we finally have the WANFLUA website back up and running. Michael was ably assisted by Alex Crowhurst in ensuring all current umpires had their

- Secured payments for umpiring pre-season matches

- And, most importantly, to have delivered an agreement with Racing and Wagering WA which has seen us raise unprecedented funds for the association through our horse guarding endeavours. These funds have been used to deliver both capital purchases for the benefit of all members (e.g. match coms, ball shooters, exercise and rehab equipment), as well as securing the financial position of the association.

I'd like to thank everyone who has served on the executive and management committees over the past six years, as well as everyone who has contributed to the operations of the WANFLUA over this period. There are too many people to name individually here,



however, it is through the efforts of people like this that our association continues to thrive and prosper.

The WANFLUA plays a critical role within the WAFL umpiring landscape. Many people will think that the only function of the WANFLUA is to provide a social calendar – this is without doubt one of our key purposes which is critical to ensure umpire enjoyment and retention, however, the association also plays a crucial role as the umpires' representative body. While the WANFLUA and its members enjoy a strong relationship with the WAFC, there have been and will continue to be times when what benefits the WAFC won't necessarily benefit

# TREASURER'S REPORT

2019 was another strong year for the WANFLUA in a financial sense, again largely due to being awarded the contract with Racing and Wagering Western Australia (RWAA) for the horse guarding of Group 1 races during the summer. As I have said in previous years, the money the WANFLUA raises through this venture far exceeds any other fundraising initiative that our association has undertaken and is principally the reason that we have yet again recorded a net profit.

This venture is not possible without the support of the umpires who volunteer their time on a Friday or Saturday in the off-season and special thanks must also go to David Thatcher and Ash Coster for their time and energy in organising the volunteers each week and continuing our great rapport with RWAA.

The funds that the WANFLUA have been able to raise over recent years through this exercise has positioned the association well and this season saw the purchase of four new rowing machines and four spin bikes for use by the rehab group. As always, the Committee is open to suggestions from our members on how best to utilise these funds so please share your ideas and continue to enhance the great environment that we have at EJ.

Member subscriptions are always a significant source of revenue for our group and allow the WANFLUA to confidently arrange some fantastic events throughout the year. After having a year off in 2018, Hall of Fame returned as a key event in the WANFLUA calendar, as well as the usual suite of functions including Panel Night, Harry's Night, Bogan Bingo and the Grand Final Dinner Dance. These events were made possible by Social Secretary, Leigh Retallack, and the rest of the social committee. Special thanks must also go to Life Member, Kendell Lamplugh (aka KB), as a key driver of the successful Hall of Fame function. Without the efforts of these individuals, we would not be able to have such enjoyable and well received social functions.



On the topic of social functions, the WANFLUA continued its transition to a cashless environment in 2019 and saw the purchase of an Apple 'Square' to provide another avenue for bank card payments at the bar. The WANFLUA also experimented with using PayPal as a means of collecting RSVPs for our main social functions and this provided another platform for online payment. The implementation of these measures not only provide improved financial control by reducing cash handling but also significantly reduce the time commitment of our volunteers.

It would be remiss of me to mention the bar and not thank our bar manager, Brendan Williamson, as well as all the other umpires who jumped behind the bar to assist throughout the year. Their services are always well appreciated by our members and guests and are a significant contributor to the success of our functions.

Another significant change in 2019 was the WAFC taking back control of training uniforms and entering into a new agreement with X-Blades as the apparel supplier for umpiring uniforms across the State. This change brought an end to our sponsorship arrangement with KC Sports and I would like to take the opportunity to thank them for their fantastic support over the past five seasons.

I have learnt a lot over the last four years as Treasurer of the WANFLUA and get great satisfaction in being able to give back to an association that has been a significant part of my life for many years. 





I felt we were able to achieve this in 2019. It all started back on Saturday February 9 when we came together as one and went on our “Resilience” themed camp. Whilst there were a few initial shocks getting off the bus, I think we all walked away from that having learnt a fair bit about ourselves and more importantly the people around us. All umpires need to be commended on the way they went about the weekend. Yes, it was something different, but being a good umpire is about being able to learn new things and be open and flexible to change.

Adam Simpson was our guest speaker on the following Sunday morning where he spoke about the West Coast Eagles culture and, ironically enough, it really aligned to what we are about, too. The weekend finished off with our Life Members coming down to EJ, having some lunch and sharing a few cold ones. It was great to have our biggest turnout of old faces for many years.

The season then loomed on our doorstep very quickly. The pre-season phase of our training was exceptional, with the majority of umpires returning some really positive benchmark times in the our 2km and 5km trials and beep testing. As we say, fitness is the cornerstone of what we do; a healthy and fit body, allows for a fit and sharp mind.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Strength and Conditioning Head Coach Duncan Bradbury, who really flourished into his role in 2019. Duncan took some feedback on board post 2018 and really tackled those challenges head on and put together a fine body of work throughout the season, even when we lost Aaron Bresland mid-season.

To all our State Game umpires, congratulations on being selected – you represented our entire WAFL umpiring team, as we would expect, with humility on selection, into professional and dedicated performances on field.



The season is made up of many highlights, sometimes too many to list, but we do need to recognise and celebrate the following:

- Michael Washbourne became the 15th person in our history to umpire 300 senior games – this is a significant achievement and one that was celebrated proudly in front of Washy's peer group, family and friends.
- We had 12 umpires make their WAFL League debuts. Whilst we might have an umpire at the pointy end celebrating his 300th, the growth of the group will always come from the umpires coming up the pathway.
- 13 umpires travelled to various parts of the country representing the broader group at the 16's and 18's National Umpiring Championships. Again, all umpires lived and breathed the values and standards of Umpiring WA.

- A wet and cold Friday night in August may not seem too special to many but for our business it was a night where we experienced history in the making, when Gabby Simmonds became the first female field umpire in the history of WAFL footy to officiate in a League game. We hope there are many more league games in store for Gabby.

- Alex Martin, a long-serving veteran of our team, announced his retirement before the final game of the season in front of family and friends in a packed Rosebury Room. Alex gave great service to the WAFC and WANFLUA over 15 years.

- The 2019 WAFL Grand Final teams – what an exceptional day of umpiring. From the thrilling Reserves game, into the Colts decider where it was as good as any League game, into the domination of Subiaco in the main event, at no stage was umpiring ever discussed and that is testament to all umpires performing incredibly well across the day. All umpires rubber stamped their selections.

- In November, Dan Johanson was elevated to the AFL Senior Field Umpires list. Essentially Dan was the “No.1 draft pick”, replacing retired AFL umpiring legend Shane McInerney. Dan now becomes the sixth WA umpire on a list of 34, something we are all very proud of and we wish him a successful journey into the AFL landscape.

To my Head Coaches Cam Douglas, Paul Mannix, Dan Gibbons, Greg Gilbee and Ryan Harder; I am very fortunate to have quality people like you doing a challenging role as you do. Nobody but me sees the endless hours and time invested into our program to make our umpires the best they can be. The pressure it can place on your own personal lives I know at times would be challenging and I can't thank you enough for being who you all are.

To Duncan Bradbury, our head strength and conditioning coach; your efforts in setting the course for our fitness is second to none. You are passionate and thorough in all that you do and we are now beginning to see fruit from all that work starting to show.

# AFLW REPORT

The third instalment of AFLW introduced two new teams to the competition and presented more opportunities for the WA-based umpiring panel.

This year our field umpires travelled interstate most weeks to officiate matches, with a higher standard of footy allowing all umpires the chance to get a leg up in terms of umpiring intensity leading into the WAFL season.

Since the introduction of the AFLW competition, significant opportunities have emerged for pathway

umpires to experience the lifestyle of an AFL umpire. You get to umpire with the best umpires outside of the AFL each week in an environment that is on par with the elite men's competition.

Each week presents its challenges in what is a professional competition and with that comes a very good opportunity and experience for those involved to develop themselves as umpires and people within the footy community.

Each of the four WA-based games were hosted at Fremantle Oval, with all encounters played in temperatures ranging from the high 20s to the low 30s. Later start times for each game also meant the Fremantle Doctor was coming in strong.

All games had healthy crowds of 4,000-6,000 people and a great atmosphere. This year our umpires were coached by a range of people, including umpires from the AFL panel, and it provided AFLW umpires with a lot of different perspectives on the game.

We saw a number of rule changes implemented this year which also brought its challenges. Some of the major AFLW-related changes included the 5-6-5 starting positions, last disposal between the 50-metre arcs only and throw-ins to be brought in by 10 metres. It was our first opportunity to implement these rules, some of which would also be included in the WAFL season.

A particular challenge for our boundary umpires included experimentation of starting positions at the centre bounce. Each week the boundary umpires had different starting positions to try and maximise their service to the game.

This year the AFLW included its first ever preliminary final games, involving the top two teams in each conference. WA had a strong contingency of umpires with Dan, Jordan and Tiana all going to Adelaide to officiate the Adelaide v Geelong preliminary final at Adelaide Oval. It was fantastic to see all three disciplines having a WA representative involved.



WA had further success for the AFLW Grand Final with Jordan Russell and Tiana Fry (bench) being selected to return to Adelaide for the decider between Adelaide and Carlton. A record crowd of 53,034 people packed the stadium to not only watch Adelaide dominate their way to a second premiership, but also breaking the record for the highest crowd at a domestic women's sporting event in Australia, previously held by the historic Optus Stadium clash between Fremantle and Collingwood in February 2018.



It is safe to say everyone on the panel enjoyed the experiences of this year and have taken on the feedback given to them during the AFLW season.

To be involved in a competition that is breaking records every year is a significant step in everybody's umpiring career.

# STRENGTH & CONDITIONING REPORT

2019 season was my fourth year as a member of the WAFL umpiring strength and conditioning team and my second at the helm. It was also Aaron Bresland's second year as our assistant strength and conditioning coach.

After observing positive improvements throughout the 2018 season, the aim for 2019 was to build on the foundation of established frameworks to maximise the performance of umpires and reduce injury risk as much as possible. This would allow the best selections to be made by the field, boundary and goal coaches for the best service of the WAFL competition possible.

The familiarity and stability built in 2018 with the new state of the art facility, including coaching and trainers' rooms, was further improved with the introduction of a new gym facility. This addition, in conjunction with the ongoing adherence to strength and conditioning programs, has no doubt contributed to the decrease in injury rates and improved morale over 2019.

Unfortunately, midway through the season we were dealt a blow with the sudden resignation of Aaron



Bresland. Although this increased the pressure and workload on myself, the loss appeared to galvanise the squad. The 2018 season and first half of 2019 was enough time for all umpires to become accustomed to the training frameworks and structure. I cannot thank the leaders of each discipline enough for the work they have done in 2019. Directing certain aspects of conditioning allowed me to float between groups, minimising lost coaching time and direct feedback.

From a performance perspective, 2019 marked the introduction of national fitness and body composition (skinfold) guidelines. I was beyond pleased with the time trial results and many of the skinfold scores would be considered elite, especially when compared to AFL umpires. We not only maintained, but accelerated forward from 2018, further increasing aerobic capacity, lactic tolerance, speed and power.

I would like to thank the coaches, trainers and other support staff for their support throughout the season. I appreciate it immensely and look forward to continuing improvement of the group moving forward into season 2020.



# TRAINERS REPORT

We look forward to most of the team returning in 2020 – it's great to see so many wanting to stay on board. I think this says a lot about the wonderful environment throughout the year.



## PRE-SEASON WRAP

The annual “camp” for WAFL umpires took a slight left-turn this year with the tried-and-true model of spending two nights away at Woodman Point shaken up in favour of a one-day “Mental Resilience and Agility Day”. And boy, was our mental resilience and agility tested.

Every umpire knew the writing was on the wall after Brett Warner from Holistic Business Training Management (HBTM) gave us a briefing session before the day to cover off on the essentials. While there was plenty of mystery around what they had in store for us, we were certainly excited.

After a 45-minute bus ride to an undisclosed location on the morning of Saturday February 9, our feet hit the gravel running – quite literally. The HBTM team of drill sergeants immediately exposed us to what life was like in the military, including lining up, following instructions and the dreaded “rewards.” But how can a reward be dreaded I hear you ask? Well, the theme was that when an instruction or controllable factor is not followed, we are “rewarded” for not fulfilling this suitably. “Rewards” comprised sets of push-ups, sit-ups, squats and lunges, which first thing in the morning certainly tested our resilience and attitudes.

This got us thinking of the things within our control that we can do to ensure we perform to the best of our abilities on the field.

After the initial reward session, it was time to move into the activities. Makeshift jerrycan holding vehicles made out of tyres and ropes were constructed and dragged through the dusty gravel, with Lucas Martin needing to utilise one of these very bumpy contraptions after



injuring his ankle in a swimming exercise.

Sudoku patterns were then made with ammunition boxes, steel poles and jerrycans. Bush huts were constructed to house a King and his family due to a natural disaster, paths had to be navigated to avoid land mines and pieces of a puzzle to crack a mysterious code had to be fetched by swimming across a rather ominous-looking creek.

The day certainly achieved what it had set out to do – test our mental resilience, provide physical challenges to test our strength, make us aware of the importance of controlling the controllables, working together in a team to get the job done, and continuing to instil the professional values required to be a WAFL umpire.

# HALL OF FAME

Following a hiatus in 2018, the prestigious Hall of Fame returned in 2019 for the induction of three of the WANFLUA's finest.

2019 also saw the Hall of Fame return to Ernest Johnson Reserve for the first time in five years in the newly christened Brett Rosebury Room inside the John McGrath Pavilion.

A red carpet was rolled out through the corridor to mark the significant occasion, with the caricatures for each of the preceding 63 inductees lining the walkway to the main hall which was magnificently transformed for the evening.



Channel 7 presenter and commentator Mark Readings was the MC for the night and opened proceedings by welcoming all of the attending Hall of Fame members on to the stage.

It was then time for the 2019 inductees – Stuart Parry (field), Greg Smith (boundary) and Adam Peacock (goal) – to have their distinguished careers celebrated and their new caricatures added to the WANFLUA Hall of Fame.

Parry was one of the most successful field umpires during a 14-year stretch which yielded 291 senior games, including an astonishing seven WAFL league grand finals and five state games.

Close friend and former WAFL umpire Gareth Parker was among those to pay tribute to Parry, who personally nominated the 2010 WAFL Grand Final – officiated alongside good mates Craig Hendrie and Gavin Statham – which Swan Districts won by a solitary point as one of the greatest moments of his career.

Until recently overtaken by current AFL umpire Rosebury, Smith was the WANFLUA's games record holder and unquestionably one of the most admired figures in the history of umpiring in Western Australia. Smith made his WAFL debut in his first season in 1994 and two years later was promoted to the AFL panel where he chalked up 159 games over the next 10

years. After retiring from the AFL at the end of 2005, he continued to ply his trade in the WAFL for another decade and proved to be a valuable mentor to a plethora of up-and-coming boundary umpires.

Peacock was often the quiet achiever of the goal umpiring fraternity during his 12-year stint with the WANFLUA which included 66 games at AFL level.

Known for his meticulous preparation before each game, Peacock made his WAFL debut in 2003 and umpired both the 2004 and 2005 WAFL grand finals before being promoted to the AFL panel where he remained for the rest of his career.

The careers of each of the three 2019 inductees were celebrated in front of family and friends, current and former WANFLUA umpires.

To be eligible for the Hall of Fame, umpires must have been retired for a minimum of three years, officiated in at least one WAFL League Grand Final, umpired at least 100 games after 1976 (prior to 1976 no game limit) and have demonstrated outstanding achievements during their career.

The experience is certainly something I will remember for a very long time and continue to be so thankful for.





#### Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2019

##### 1 Statement of significant accounting policies

The significant policies which have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report are:

##### Basis of accounting

The financial report is a special purpose financial report that has been prepared for its members in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Interpretations, other authoritative announcements and the Association Handbook in a form appropriate for a sporting association.

It has been prepared on the basis of historical costs and except where stated, does not take into account changing money values or fair values of non-current assets.

The accounting policies have been consistently applied, and, except where there is a change in accounting policy, are consistent with those of the previous year.

##### Statement of compliance

The financial report complies with Australian Accounting Standards, which include Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (AIFRS). Compliance with AIFRS ensures that the financial report, comprising the financial statements and notes thereto, complies with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS).

##### (a) Revenue recognition

Revenues are recognised at fair value of the consideration received.

Membership – Membership revenue is driven through subscription fees. All membership income is recognised in the financial year in which it has been received to accurately match membership revenue with events held.

Interest – Interest income is recognised when it is credited.

##### (b) Receivables

Subscriptions shall be payable in the case of an Active Member immediately on notification of appointment as an Umpire and in all other cases no later than the 31st of May each year.

Collectability of debtors is reviewed on an ongoing basis. A provision for doubtful debts is raised where doubt as to the collection exists and debts which are known to be uncollectible are written off.

##### (c) Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Acquisition – All acquisitions of assets (except caricatures but including the updating on all honour boards, photos and framing of posters) are recorded at the cost of acquisition, being the purchase consideration determined as at the date of acquisition, plus costs incidental to acquisition.

Caricatures – They are anticipated to have indeterminate useful life. Their service potential has not, in any material sense, been consumed during the reporting period and as such, no amount for depreciation is recognised.

Depreciation – From 1 January 2016 purchases <\$2,000 to be depreciated at a rate of 100%. Purchases of a large amount will be depreciated on a case by case basis based on the assets expected useful life.

Assets purchased in 2019 financial year with a value of >\$2,000 have been depreciated on the straight-line method with a useful life of five (5) years.

The Balance Sheet should be read in conjunction with the accompanying notes.

**(d) Cash assets**

Cash assets are carried at face value of the amounts deposited.

**(e) Inventories**

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Net realisable value is determined on the basis of each inventory line's estimated selling price.

**(f) Payables**

Trade creditors represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Association prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

**(g) Taxes**

The Association is exempt from the payment of income tax under the Income Tax Assessment Act.

Goods and services tax (GST) - Revenue, expenses, assets and liabilities are recognised inclusive of the amount of GST.


