## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It was an honour and a privilege to be elected by as WANFLUA president for season 2020. Although it was a year in which events and circumstances never seen before with COVID-19 brought about change to both umpiring and the wider football landscape, I am proud to have been able to represent the group through this time.

Firstly, I want to thank both the running and life members for their support and ongoing commitment to keeping the longstanding traditions of the WANFLUA alive, particularly through a difficult year. Few associations have 68 years of proud history to look back on and it is something we as the current group of umpires must continue to preserve for many more years to come.

The COVID-19 pandemic provided uncertainty and circumstances that, like many, the WANFLUA has never encountered before, from umpires initially training in small groups away from EJ and then individually with the likelihood of no season at all, through to the return of WAFL football for a shortened 2020 season.

To the team at the WAFC in David Crute, Scott Baker and Gavin Taylor that were heavily involved in the negotiations and process in reaching a pay and conditions agreement with the WANFLUA for the season that took place, I cannot thank them enough for the co-operative approach that was taken from all parties in reaching agreeable terms. This agreement would not have been possible without you as the membership agreeing to umpire under these reduced conditions to which I thank all members for.

Going forward into 2021, although a reduction in pay is likely, it should not be to the level that we experienced in 2020 and the WAFC have indicated that our next MOU for the 2022 and 2023 seasons should see a return to pre-COVID pay and conditions.

I would also like to thank Dean Margetts as the WAFL Umpire Manager and his coaching staff led by Cam



Douglas, Greg Gilbee and Ryan Harder. This year asked a lot of the coaching staff, all while they had uncertainty around their own employment at the WAFC. The coaches, along with Andrea Boots, continued to support our members throughout the duration of 2020, even when they were stood down from their own jobs, and the entire group should be thankful for their level of commitment.

One item that does remain outstanding is a completed Umpire Policy and Procedures manual which has not been

issued by the WAFC for the last three seasons. While we understand some of the circumstances around why its release has been delayed due to high staff turnover within the WAFC, the WANFLUA believes it is imperative for our running members to have clear guidelines around what is required of them, including policies around use of social media, and we will continue to pursue this as a matter of urgency until it has been distributed to the group. At the time of writing this report, the final draft of this document is being reviewed so hopefully this should not be far away.

The WANFLUA was fortunate to once again be awarded the horse guarding contract by Racing and Wagering WA and I would very much like to thank those members who volunteered their time to assist with this exercise. As has been the case for the past six years, the funds raised help maintain the association's very strong financial position and it is this fundraising that allowed the WANFLUA to not charge members fees in 2020 and be able to handle the COVID-19 challenge. The funds also allow us to significantly subsidise the many events on the WANFLUA social calendar and continue to make capital purchases.

Again, I strongly urge members to volunteer their time to assist the RWWA with horse guarding duties so the WANFLUA can retain the full financial benefits of this contract, while also offering suggestions as to how we

can spend some of these funds in a sustainable way.

I would personally like to extend a special thank you to outgoing WANFLUA President McLane Edinger. Despite retiring at the end of 2019, McLane has been there to assist me with the negotiations for pay and conditions in 2020 every step of the way. There was no obligation for McLane to put in the amount of time and effort that he has since he retired and it is a credit to the type of person that he is to continue assisting our group. McLane has been integral in continuing the good relationship the WANFLUA has with the WAFC, as well as handling a smooth transition to our new constitution to fall in line the government-requested changes. I wish McLane all the best in finally being able to enjoy his retirement.

With McLane, Alex Martin and Ben Laycock all long-serving executive members stepping down at the end of 2019, it provided a chance for some new committee members to fill the void. I would like to thank Michael Washbourne for coming on to assist me as the vice-president and it has been great to see Mark Holford excel as our new secretary. Although at the AGM we did not have a treasurer, I would like to thank Nick Wrenn for subsequently putting his hand up to take this on for the balance of the year. We also welcomed new general committee members in Bayley Lamont

and Christian Cutrona. There will be more positions on the committee open for 2021 and it would be fantastic to see some more new faces become involved in supporting our group.

I would like to acknowledge the work of Jordan Fry, Mark Holford and Michael Washbourne for continuing to expand the website and our Facebook page with regular news and information now being released for all members to access. I would also like to thank Kendell Lamplugh (KB) for her work in managing our Life Members and past member communication and events. KB does a great job in keeping these members connected to our group and we hope that continues into the future.

I would also like to extend my gratitude to Marian Noonan of Willow Lane Design for the production of this yearbook and Bayley Lamont for his photography work throughout the year.

Finally, I would like to thank my partner Isabella for her love and support during this year and for me to continue in this role.

I look forward to a 2021 season that will see the return of our social functions and a full year of football and umpiring for our group.

Our first year Talent Academy umpires I also expect will stake further claims in 2021 for spots in Colts and Reserves football.

My personal thanks to Geoff O'Neill for his assistance during the season. Geoff is our Yoda, someone who speaks from experience and has an intimate knowledge of the boundary umpiring craft. I

cannot thank Geoff enough for what he brings to the table. We are very fortunate to have someone of his calibre in our team.

Congratulations and my compliments to all boundary umpires who were rewarded with finals and grand finals in 2020. Your performances were exemplary and befitting of the appointment.

As a coaching and management team, we were extremely pleased and proud of everyone in our group.

All in all, a challenging, difficult but overall successful 2020. It was one that pulled on the emotions, but we got around each other, enjoyed the season for what it offered and demonstrated who we are.

## AFL REPORT

 Dean Margetts (350 AFL games)

Brett Dalglish also umpired his 300th senior game (combined WAFL and AFL) while Brett Rosebury registered his 500th senior game – the first person ever to achieve this milestone in the history of WA football.

As with any year, there are always a large number



of people behind the scenes that help make it all happen. A big thank you is due to Geoff O'Neill and John Marrapodi for the coaching and guidance they provided to the boundary and goal teams. And, of course, to our medical team of Tayla Lewis, Jennifer Gresham and Jess Gregor for their constant support at training and on match day.

In late 2019, goal umpire Luke Edwards announced his relocation to Melbourne, providing long-time rookie Sam Hunter a place on the WA goal umpires list. Luke's contribution to the WA AFL team was significant and he no doubt will remain a respected member and





friend to the group.

When Round 1 came, minutes before walking out on to the ground the team learned that the season had effectively been called off in WA, providing a surreal match-day experience and a strange feeling of the national focus being on the team much like a final with the nation's eyes watching.

Round 2 kicked off again in June with Dean Margetts and Nathan Doig opting to travel to the Gold Coast hub to continue umpiring until Round 7 when AFL matches would resume in WA. It was on the Gold Coast that Dean umpired his 350th AFL game after remarkably having never officiated a game in Brisbane throughout his career.

The Perth hub with Geelong and Collingwood provided opportunities for the WA goal umpires Sal Boud, Sam Hunter and I to bunk up at Crown Perth and umpire a few games under strict quarantine conditions. It was in this hub that Sam made his long-awaited AFL goal umpiring debut in the Western Derby in Round 7, while I was at the other end umpiring my 150th AFL match. Sam's patience and consistency at WAFL while being the AFL rookie for the three seasons prior had rewarded him.

Once the two-week quarantine period was over, the rest of the WA squad was able to be appointed as well, as Hawthorn and Carlton joined the WA teams for another four-week round robin. Having spent the 2019 season as a field umpire rookie, including one game off



the bench as the emergency, Dan Johanson made his formally appointed AFL debut when Fremantle took on Hawthorn on Monday 10 August. Dan brought the number of WA field umpires currently umpiring AFL to six of the 34 listed nationally.

At the conclusion of these two hubs, the majority of the WA AFL squad's season finished with it. Dean and I were offered the chance to continue umpiring from the Gold Coast hub and both travelled with Fremantle and GWS the day after the last Perth game. Fortunately we were both successful in making the finals panel. I umpired the first semi-final at the Gabba before heading home to complete my mandatory two-week quarantine at home.

For me, hub life was extraordinary. To see and live similar lives to the players was quite the insight. Having access to unlimited food, a huge commercial-sized gym and a personal barista for nine weeks was fantastic and something I still miss. But not being home to support my pregnant wife and spend time with my two-year-old daughter was something I did not enjoy. I suspect I'll never get another opportunity like it. It was a wake-up call to consider the reasons I umpire and from where the joy comes from. Without support networks, family and friends around, umpiring becomes very business-like and for me, a lot less enjoyable. I encourage all umpires at WAFL to carefully consider where your joy in umpiring comes from. I hope it comes from a healthy and productive place.

2020 was quite a ride. I'm glad I was part of it, but I'm also very glad it's over.

On occasions we were joined by seasoned AFL umpires who imparted their experience and coaching to help us to improve our game.

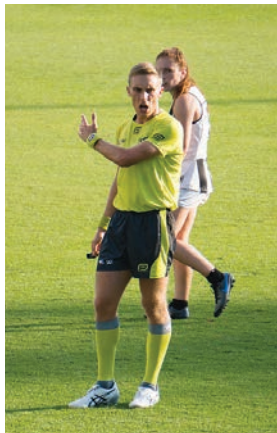

## STRENGTH & CONDITIONING REPORT

2020 was my third year leading the strength and conditioning team for umpiring in WA. This year we welcomed a new assistant coach to the team in Mackenzie Liddelow. Mackenzie is one of Australia's best long jumpers and a handy sprinter over the shorter distances. This in conjunction with his tertiary education made him a very handy addition to the elite training environment at WAFL umpiring. We also welcomed university students Brad Mann, Lachlan McRobb, Luke Dyson, Matt Purcell and Curt Miller to the team.

The year started in a familiar fashion with many notable and impressive time trial results. The location chosen for this year's run was McGillivray Oval and it provided us with fabulous conditions for what was a great landmark of the 2020 pre-season. Shortly after this joyous occasion, the world was rocked by COVID-19 and government regulations to slow the spread of the virus meant that all grades of Australian Rules football across the country had to be put on hold. This included both matches and training.

With the cancelling of group training it was now largely going to be up to the umpires themselves to motivate and complete training sessions to maintain a level of match fitness. The uncertainty of when and what was going to happen next would weigh heavily on the minds of our umpires. In the short term, during isolation training umpires were prescribed a hybrid program which was designed to maintain a level of 'in season' fitness and as such included tough match simulation sessions each weekend. Communication on progress and mindset between coaches and umpires was done via video and email.

Upon return to training in late June, I was delighted at the mental resilience on display. Umpires had returned in phenomenal physical condition and were ready to get on with the job of season 2020. In the few short weeks leading up to the season restart we built on the foundation of an 'extended' pre-season. While injuries occurred, they were extremely limited which displays the diligence of umpires during isolation training. This resilience was a key reason for the success we saw and enabled umpires to quickly catapult themselves from a closed training environment into managing groups and officiating our great game.



A key factor in the growth of our training environment was the introduction of university students as strength and conditioning assistants. My thanks goes to Professor Karen Wallman of The University of Western Australia and Zane McDonald of Edith Cowan University for placing their students with us. The extra coaches on training nights significantly reduced the workload on myself and Mackenzie, allowing us to roam freely between groups, as each umpiring discipline was overseen by its own "coach".

I would also like to thank David Crute for being the rock of 2020. He organised and oversaw all umpiring logistics when the WAFC was understaffed. I don't think we could have had a football season without him. My gratitude also goes to Dean Margetts, the coaches, trainers and other support staff for their support throughout the year. I cannot understate how much the support network means to me personally and I look forward to what should be a fantastic season in 2021.

# TRAINERS REPORT

Our trainers did a great job as did the rest of the WAFL team adjusting to the challenges 2020 threw at us with COVID-19. We started off the year with another group of fabulous trainers, with most of 2019 group returning for another season. We had an experienced team of trainers with most being third or fourth year physio students getting ready to graduate at the end of the year.

Emily Bell and Phoebe Robertson did a great job looking after the Community Umpires at the start of the year. Unfortunately as the year progressed we lost both of them to full-time work commitments. Post COVID-19 lockdown when the season finally did start, the rest of the team did a great job stepping in to help and make sure they were all looked after appropriately.



It was a weird season to say the least once it did get up and running. We kept a small group of reliable and experienced trainers, as we didn't know what the season would hold. They ended up working their butts off over the year to make sure we could look after everyone. Most completed three games each weekend, as well as looking after anything extra that came along. Everyone adapted really well and I could not be more proud.

COVID-19 threw some new challenges at us with respect to training and we had to be on our toes to make sure we could keep everyone as safe as possible. To begin with there was no physical contact; we stuck to giving out injury advice, diagnosing and prescribing rehabilitation programs. This was mostly seen as a positive. As much as we are more than happy to help when it is required, we love to follow an evidence-based approach and encourage self-management strategies, as well as injury prevention strategies throughout the season, rather than just reacting to injuries after they happen.

AFL was another story all together. Jen Gresham and I worked the first game of the year. Having no crowd

was an experience we hope we never have again. The game was eerie and there was absolutely no atmosphere. Once the AFL came back post lock down it was all go. I was COVID-19 tested twice a week to be able to treat our WA team as well as the travelling umpires. Jen, Jess Gregor and Zoe O'Meara were also tested prior to games and having just one trainer on match day made it a busy pre-game, but we adapted to the challenge and will be pretty happy when things go back to normal.

We really appreciated how the coaching and management team, as well as all the umpires, respected our suggestions this year. I think the whole group did a great job adapting to the year and supporting one another. Being in WA we were lucky enough to celebrate such a strange year and once again had a great time at the Dinner Dance.

A lot of our experienced trainers are now qualified and moving on to private practice or hospital roles, so it will be great to see a team of fresh new faces in 2021 that will hopefully hang around for the next few years to look after our umpires.

## CULTURE CAMP

Like every year, a major event during the pre-season phase is the camp. However, the 2020 edition took a different turn to previous years, focusing on culture. Branching out from focusing exclusively on WAFL-listed umpires, development squad umpires were invited to attend the camp for the first time ever. Over 150 umpires attended the camp across a weekend in February, with a common goal of discussing, sharing and analysing the culture within Umpiring WA, and how as a team a cultural brand could be developed for years to come.

Umpires arrived early on a beautiful Saturday morning at Tuart College, the new home of the WAFC. A fresh brew of coffee courtesy of Gypsy Soul Coffee Caravan was provided to all umpires to energise them for a big day ahead. All umpires were then introduced to the facilitators of the camp, Matt and Errol, who discussed their backgrounds and their common goals in developing a new culture within Umpiring WA.

The first exercise of the morning saw umpires split into groups of 10. Umpires were then asked to brainstorm the positives, the areas for development and key learnings from 2019. A spokesperson from each group shared with the wider team what was discussed. The different feedback captured the diversity within the wider team before individual umpires took the microphone and spoke on what they believed were the ongoing strengths of the team and areas where they thought the team could continue to develop.

A common theme of discussion was the notion of umpiring being an individual team sport. The first exercise laid the foundation for an insightful weekend, with umpires feeling very comfortable to discuss matters in front of a supportive and attentive audience.

After morning tea, Jeff Dalglish introduced the 'rope challenge' to the group. The challenge required all umpires to pass through a rope while remaining linked to teammates. In their pre-selected and random teams, umpires then headed outside to try and defeat the record of 37 seconds. The blue team were the most successful, while the green and yellow teams struggled for a cohesive strategy.

Errol and Matt utilised the 'rope challenge' as a



metaphor for the umpiring culture and environment. Umpires were questioned and challenged on strategies used in the 'rope challenge' and how it related to the culture within Umpiring WA. Errol transitioned the discussion towards mental health and the societal issue of men being unable to express and accept emotion. It was touched on that umpiring is a largely masculine dominated sport, and the constant issue of accepting feedback, both positive and negative.

Umpires were then treated to a classic lunch of roast chicken, chips and salad. It was a chance for a 'mental icebath' after a taxing and insightful first half of the day. Umpires enjoyed each other's company by playing cricket and basketball in the gymnasium, while others chatted over lunch.

After lunch, umpires headed back outside to try and improve on the first run of the 'rope challenge'. The results were impressive. All teams saw major improvement on their first attempt, with an increase in team energy and spirit was a contributing factor to the improvement. It was great to see umpires high-fiving fellow team members and rejoicing at the improvement.

Similarly to the first challenge, umpires then headed back inside to debrief the second attempt at the challenge. Errol and Matt expressed their delight and emotion at how all three teams adapted to the challenges of the morning session. It prompted a discussion as to how the entire umpiring group had begun cultivating a culture which could be carried through the rest of the camp, the season and into the future.

After the debrief of the second challenge, WAFL Umpiring Manager Dean Margetts unveiled Umpiring WA's cultural charter. Dean, Errol and State Umpiring Manager David Crute discussed the process in developing the cultural charter and how it extended beyond the WAFL umpiring team, and to all umpiring groups across the State.

Members who attended the 'cultural workshop' in October to devise the Umpiring WA cultural charter were invited to speak to the group. Grant Vernon kicked off the discussion, sharing his personal experience of culture and how he hoped the charter would establish a new chapter in Umpiring WA. Current umpires Brad Hunt and Oscar Wharton also outlined the challenging process of devising the charter so it could cater to the diversity in umpiring 'families' across the State. Former umpires David Shawcross and Paul Mannix (MBTA coach) also discussed their experiences of the umpiring culture and urged the wider team to continue fostering a positive culture.

The final session of Saturday was the most emotional one for the camp. Errol and Matt prompted umpires and coaches with six questions about their personal purpose. Umpires and coaches were required to reflect on their individual strengths and challenges, personal idols and what their purpose is and how it applies within an umpiring context. Umpires were invited to speak in front of the group and share their individual stories. The safe, connected environment saw some umpires share personal experiences that many were not aware of.

The first day of the camp concluded with umpires sharing their reflections on the day, and what they felt was important to developing a great culture. At this moment it was apparent many umpires and coaches were mentally fatigued and another 'mental icebath' was required.

On Sunday morning, umpires arrived back at Tuart College with bacon and egg burgers – courtesy of the WAFC umpiring team - helping to get the second day rolling. The Gypsy Soul Coffee Caravan was back again to serve everyone's morning coffee. WAFC CEO Gavin Taylor also joined the umpiring team to assist cooking bacon and eggs.

State Boundary Umpires Coach Greg Gilbee commenced the morning's proceedings with reflections from the first day. Umpires split into pairs to get to know each other, and three pairs were invited to the front to share what they learnt. A handful of



umpires also shared personal challenges they face in front of the team.

After the discussion for the first part of the morning, umpires headed for the oval to have a third run at the 'rope challenge'. Once again, all three teams improved their strategy, with improved results. Jeff then asked the entire group to complete the 'rope challenge', fusing all three teams together. The record was 99 seconds for 102 people. Brad took a leadership role posing an effective strategy which was subsequently adopted. The positivity and energy faded, however, and the entire team was unable to break the record. Nonetheless, all umpires supported and congratulated each other.

Errol and Matt then kicked off the final discussion for the camp. Umpires spoke about getting the balance between the process and outcome optimal. Errol then posed the question of how the cultural charter could be applied in an everyday umpiring context, with many umpires providing their thoughts. Umpires were then asked to 'role play' a cultural issue and how effective leadership could pose a solution. Some umpires outlined how they had faced selection disappointment in the past. Errol outlined how using leadership and the cultural charter is an appropriate way to create a good environment to deal with conflict and disappointment in an umpiring context.

To conclude the camp, Errol, Matt, Dean and David provided their closing thoughts on the weekend. The WANFLUA committee then fired up the BBQ to provide lunch and cold drinks to members. Umpires enjoyed the social interaction over lunch, with many sharing in games of cricket, basketball and volleyball to round out an important weekend, which one umpire described as a "line in the sand moment".

#### Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2020

##### 1 Statement of significant accounting policies

The significant policies which have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report are:

##### Basis of accounting

The financial report is a special purpose financial report that has been prepared for its members in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Interpretations, other authoritative announcements and the Association Handbook in a form appropriate for a sporting association.

It has been prepared on the basis of historical costs and except where stated, does not take into account changing money values or fair values of non-current assets.

The accounting policies have been consistently applied, and, except where there is a change in accounting policy, are consistent with those of the previous year.

##### Statement of compliance

The financial report complies with Australian Accounting Standards, which include Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (AIFRS). Compliance with AIFRS ensures that the financial report, comprising the financial statements and notes thereto, complies with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS).

##### (a) Revenue recognition

Revenues are recognised at fair value of the consideration received.

Membership – Membership revenue is driven through subscription fees. All membership income is recognised in the financial year in which it has been received to accurately match membership revenue with events held.

Interest – Interest income is recognised when it is credited.

##### (b) Receivables

Subscriptions shall be payable in the case of an Active Member immediately on notification of appointment as an Umpire and in all other cases no later than the 31st of May each year.

Collectability of debtors is reviewed on an ongoing basis. A provision for doubtful debts is raised where doubt as to the collection exists and debts which are known to be uncollectable are written off.

##### (c) Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Acquisition – All acquisitions of assets (except caricatures but including the updating on all honour boards, photos and framing of posters) are recorded at the cost of acquisition, being the purchase consideration determined as at the date of acquisition, plus costs incidental to acquisition.

Caricatures – They are anticipated to have indeterminate useful life. Their service potential has not, in any material sense, been consumed during the reporting period and as such, no amount for depreciation is recognised.

Depreciation - From 1 January 2016 purchases <\$2,000 to be depreciated at a rate of 100%. Purchases of a large amount will be depreciated on a case by case basis based on the assets expected useful life.

Assets purchased in 2019 financial year with a value of >\$2,000 have been depreciated on the straight-line method with a useful life of five (5) years.

The Balance Sheet should be read in conjunction with the accompanying notes.

for the year ended 31 December 2020

**(d) Cash assets**

Cash assets are carried at face value of the amounts deposited.

**(e) Inventories**

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Net realisable value is determined on the basis of each inventory line's estimated selling price.

**(f) Payables**

Trade creditors represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Association prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

**(g) Taxes**

The Association is exempt from the payment of income tax under the Income Tax Assessment Act.

Goods and services tax (GST) - Revenue, expenses, assets and liabilities are recognised inclusive of the amount of GST.
