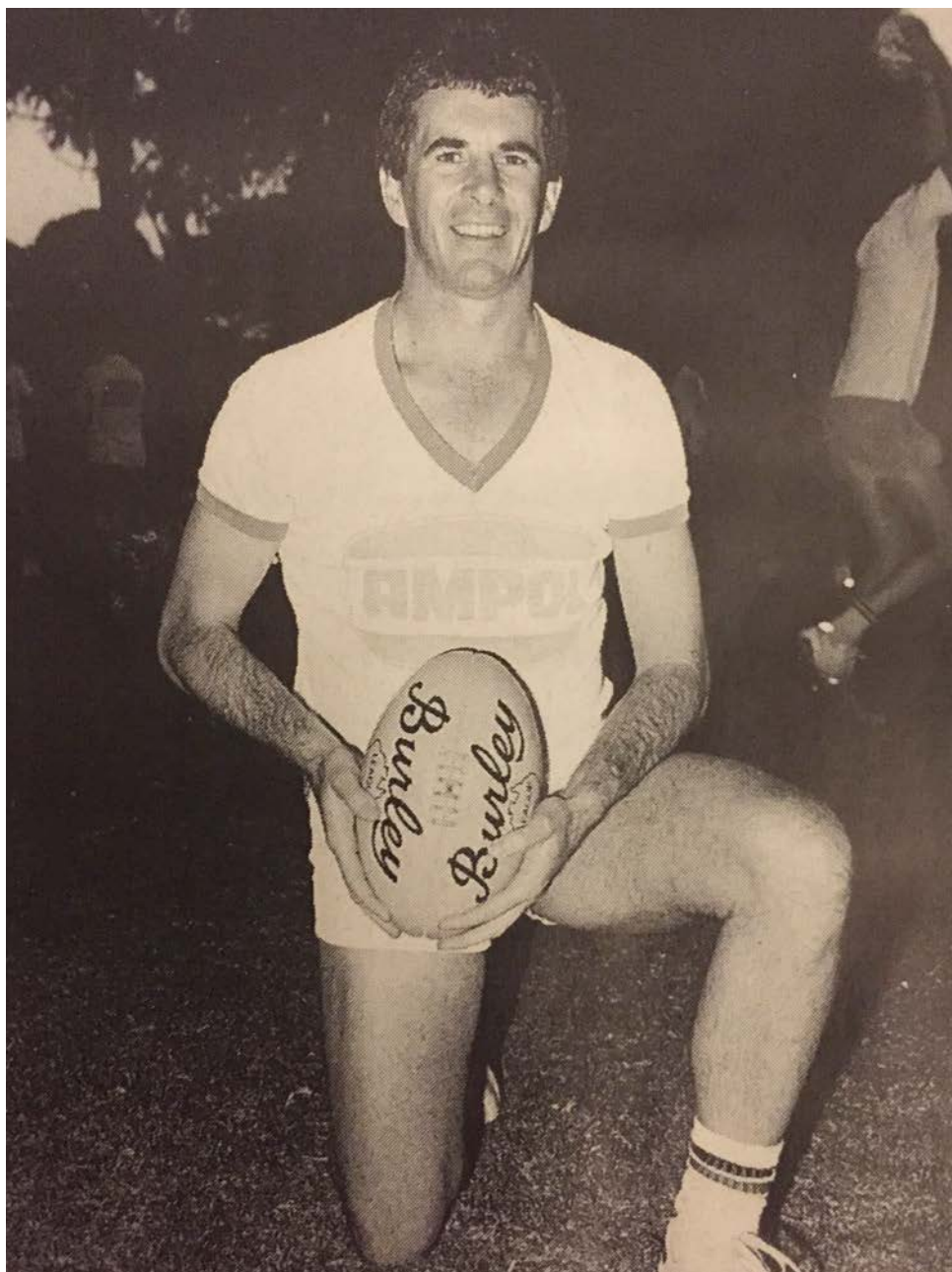

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

David Thatcher

It was an honour and a privilege to be elected as WANFLUA president for season 2021 and although it has been a year still affected in some way by the COVID-19 pandemic, I am proud to have been able to represent the group through this time.

Firstly, I want to thank both the running and life members for their support and ongoing commitment to keeping the longstanding traditions of the WANFLUA alive, particularly through a difficult year. Few associations have 69 years of proud history to look back on and it is something we as the current group of umpires must continue to preserve for many more years to come.

In 2021, we understood that the group would again be affected by COVID-19 and the WANFLUA executive aimed to minimise this as much as possible and were happy that pay rates were only impacted in the range of a 10-15% reduction depending on the grade and discipline.

To the team at the WAFC in David Crute, Scott Baker and new CEO Michael Roberts who were all heavily involved in the negotiations and process in reaching a pay and conditions agreement with the WANFLUA for the season that took place, I cannot thank them enough for the co-operative approach that was taken across both parties in reaching an agreement. The continued support from the WAFC executive for umpiring in general and the association is something the WANFLUA does not take for granted.

After working through two difficult seasons on reduced pay, it is likely the group will return to our 2019 pay rates for the 2022/23 season MOU which will hopefully be finalised not long after the writing of this report. This is a great result for our group given the impacts COVID-19 has had on the wider football industry.

I would like to thank Dean Margetts as the WAFL Umpires Manager and his coaching staff led by Cam Douglas, Greg Gilbee and Ryan Harder. The coaches, along with Andrea Boots, continued to support our members throughout the duration of 2021 in what was a year that had changes occurring regularly to scheduling, training and all aspects of umpiring.



I am pleased to say that during the 2021 season, the WANFLUA along with the WAFC managed to get the Policy and Procedure manual released for the first time in over five years. This document is now available online for all umpires and the relevant WAFC staff to access. Thanks to the efforts of David Crute and Andrea Boots in getting this document finished and released to umpires.

The WANFLUA was fortunate to once again be awarded the horse guarding contract by Racing and Wagering WA and I would very much like to thank those members who volunteered their time to assist with this exercise. As has been the case for the past six years, the funds raised help maintain the Association's very strong financial position which allows for heavily subsidised social functions to continue, as well as providing added benefits for members throughout the course of the year.

Once again I strongly urge members to volunteer their time to assist the RWWA with horse guarding duties so the WANFLUA can retain the full financial benefits of this contract. Suggestions as to how we can spend some of these funds in a sustainable way are also welcomed.

This year we had some stability in our executive with Nick Wrenn and Mark Holford continuing as Treasurer

and Secretary and Michael Washbourne supporting me as the Vice President. We also welcomed new general committee members in Ethan Lamont, Maddison Lamont and Alex Crowhurst which has been great to see.

Sadly, Washy announced his retirement at the end of 2021, ending what has been a great career on the field but also off it as one of the key contributors to the WANFLUA over the journey. From his work on Yearbooks through to serving on the executive the past two seasons, his passion and support of the Association is appreciated by me personally and the WANFLUA.

There will be more open positions on the committee in 2022 with Mark Holford also not continuing in 2022 and Sean Moylan stepping away from the General Committee. It would be fantastic to see some more new faces become involved in supporting our group.

I would also personally like to acknowledge the work of Mark Holford and Michael Washbourne on continuing to expand the website and our Facebook page with regular news and information now being released for all members to access.

A huge thanks also to Kendell Lamplugh (KB) for her work in managing our Life Members and past member communication and events. KB does a great job in keeping these members connected to our group which was reflected in the amount of life and past members at the Hall of Fame function this year and we hope that continues.

I would also like to extend my gratitude to Marian Noonan of Willow Lane Design for the production of this yearbook and Bayley Lamont for his photography work throughout the year.

Finally, I would like to thank my partner Isabella for her love and support during this year which allows me to continue in this role.

I look forward to a 2022 season that will see the WANFLUA celebrate its 70th Anniversary – a huge milestone that we will look to celebrate during the course of the year.

With Ben officially retiring from the role after the 2020 AGM, the WANFLUA was without a Treasurer until I started in early 2021. The WANFLUA accounts were managed by David Thatcher in the interim and I would like to thank him for adding to his already busy portfolio to make sure the accounts were still taken care of.

I would also like to recognise Rhett Hollick, who has been our honorary auditor since our 2014 financials. 2021 will be the last financial report that Rhett will audit and I thank him for his service and support in helping me understand all the necessary accounting jargon that I needed to know to make sure the financials were done properly.

Whilst I have very little accounting experience, this job is being made quite simple with the continuation of our major fundraising venture with the RWWA, by supplying horse guards for the summer racing carnival. Thank you to all those members who continue to volunteer their time over the off-season. As you will see later in this report, this unique fundraising venture allows us to continue spending on our functions and providing an ongoing enjoyable environment both on and off the training track.

Compared to some other state leagues around the country, we were lucky to have a season go ahead in 2021 despite being half the usual duration and being paid half of our normal match fees. Thanks to our healthy budget position, we were able to make our subscriptions in 2020 free for all members before reverting back to our 2019 rates in 2021. To not have to increase our subscription fees once again is testament to the health of our budget.



In 2021, we were able to return to our regular social calendar including Panel Night, Harry's Night, Hall of Fame, Presentation Night and Dinner Dance. To make up for not holding it in 2020, we were able to contribute greater funds to the Hall of Fame compared to previous years at EJ and make it a memorable event for all those who attended.

Without the horse guarding funds, we would not be in the position of continual annual profits as well as being able to set money aside for our term deposit account. If this fundraising money for whatever reason stops, we would have to consider significantly reducing the money we currently spend

on our members. I implore those who enjoy our social functions and would like to contribute to the association to ask any of the committee members about how they can get involved.

2022 will be an exciting year with our Team of the Decade function. The committee was able to set aside some money over the past 10 years towards it and combined with our current financial position I'm sure we will be able to make it one of the greatest functions in our history.

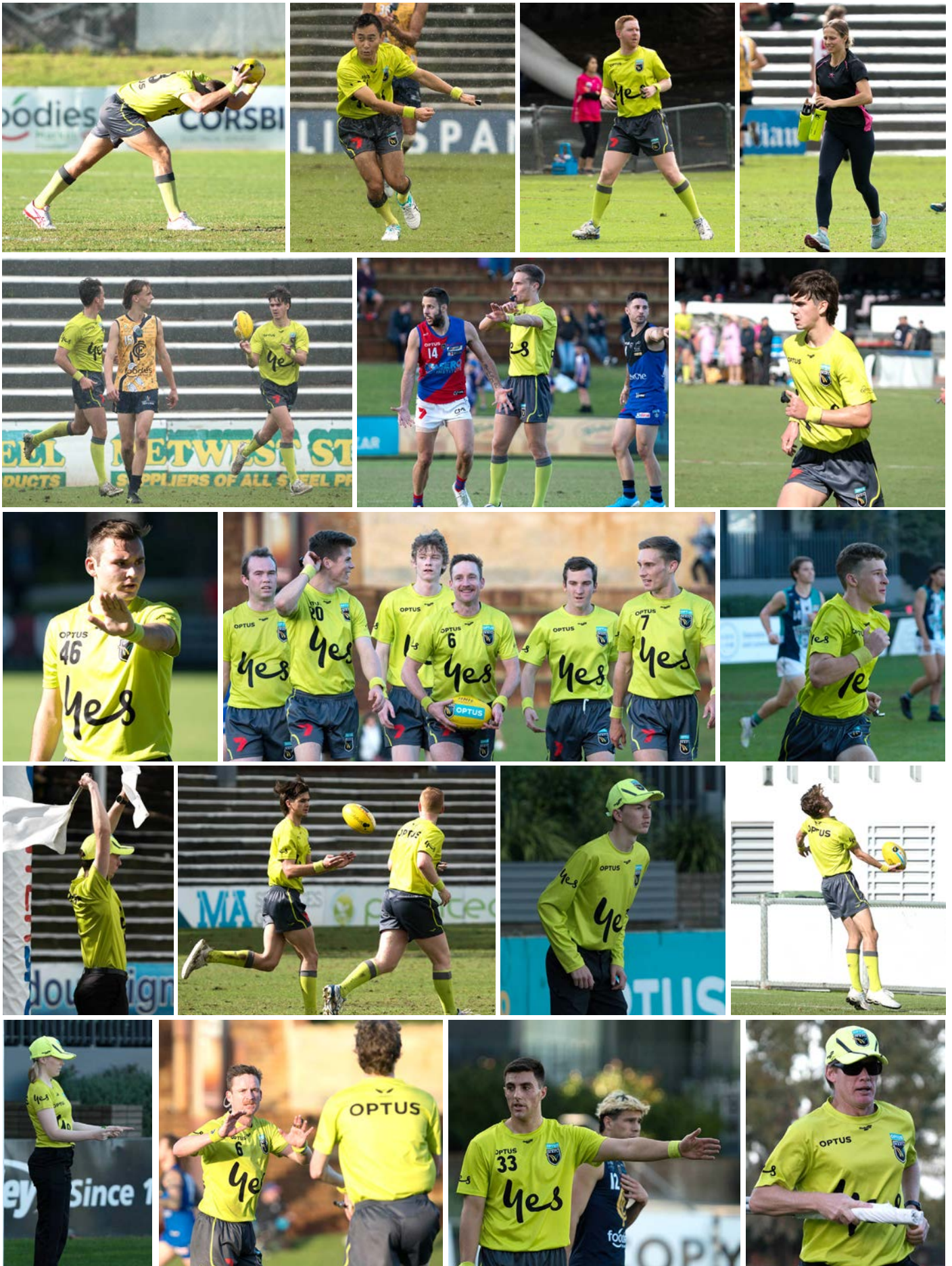














WAFL UMPIRE MANAGER'S REPORT

BOUNDARY UMPIRES REPORT

WAFL Boundary Umpiring saw much change and opportunity in 2021.

Prior to the season starting, 2020 League Grand Final Umpire Mitch Vernon decided to have a year off and stalwart Brad Hunt retired. As many as 15 umpires moved on and we needed to supplement our list. From the outset, the year was always going to be a challenging one with competitions back in full swing and the demand for umpires arguably greater than ever before.



As well as a full season of WAFL requiring 39 boundary umpires across 13 games every week, our boundaries also served the PSA and Senior Community competitions. The demands were high and with a developing list, injuries impacted and tested the mettle and resilience of everyone. Many umpires ran games Saturday and Sunday, such were the demands, but through it all we serviced our obligations to our standards and importantly saw the improvements across our ranks.

We started 2021 with a list size of 42 boundaries between the High Performance and Talent Academy teams. We also welcomed on board 14 new boundary umpires to our Development Squad.

Pre-season highlighted the commitment with sessions building fitness and the opportunity to renew friendships and build new relationships. Nick Wrenn, Lewis Williams, Ethan Lamont, Jordan Russell and Luke Graves received AFLW Contracts and were back in action early in the year.

Our group possesses tremendous diversity across age, gender and background which is really pleasing. Our female cohort grew to include Shelby McDonald, Nadia Godley, MacKenzie Scholes and Tara Reed.

In a terrific umpiring story, Tara and her brother Zac joined us, as did their father Matt, who ran the boundary in the 2000 WAFL Grand Final. As well as coaching, Matt also umpired when numbers were stretched.

The WAFLW season commenced in February, providing boundary umpires some terrific match-day running in a competition that continues to evolve and improve. Last disposal was in effect and we were on hand with the lasso.

Following a very competitive pre-season, it was with great pleasure that we announced Trent Ramshak as the Ron Hall medallist.

In a year of debuts, Trent Ramshak, Jaco Jansen Van Rensburg, Alex Kain, Jai Cook, Nicholas Holmes and Charley Wehr all experienced League football. Several Development Squad umpires debuted in Colts and Reserves, and the experience gained in 2021 will hold many in good stead for 2022.

Equally important and significant is the game experience and skill sets shared by our High Performance umpires who provide tremendous support to those umpires in the early stages of their journey. Having experienced people of the ilk of Thatcher, Wrenn, Kukura and Washbourne is significant to the group.

Congratulations to all umpires who achieved finals and grand Finals, notably Ethan Lamont umpiring his first League Grand Final.

Thank you to our retiring umpires in Michael Washbourne, Justin Harrex and Jack Burns; you have all made a wonderful contribution and we trust you won't be a stranger on the other side of the white line.

Where would we be without coaches and, in particular, our own Geoff O'Neill who week in, week out enlightens and challenges our group. Match day coaching is largely volunteered so thank you to Phil, Dom and Matt for playing your role.

To my peers in Cam and Ryan and our leader in Dean, thanks for your support, camaraderie and time in a season that posed as many challenges as rewards.

WA boundary group taking the unique milestone of officiating the most AFL games in a 5-umpire system. The season had a number of other milestones as well, with Nathan Doig, Jeff Dalglish and Brett Rogers officiating their 400th, 350th and 300th senior games respectively.

While 2021 certainly had not been normal, it wasn't until Round 6 that it began to mirror the 2020 season. Within hours of the ANZAC round match beginning between Fremantle and North Melbourne, the first Perth lockdown of the season was called, resulting in the game being contested in front of an empty Optus Stadium.

"2020 was quite a ride. I'm glad I was part of it, but I'm also very glad it's over." These are the words that Brett Rogers ended his AFL report with in 2020. He was quite right, 2020 was a ride, but 2021 was the sequel that no one asked for, although admittedly had a much better ending.

2021 started off much like 2020 ended, with crowd restrictions, mandatory COVID testing and extreme uncertainty around the future of the season. 2021 did throw up its own challenges early in the year, with a few games played in extreme heat resulting in the

The Round 7 derby was contested in similar circumstances, and with no certainty as to spectator access to future games, the AFL made the decision to move Fremantle's next home game against Brisbane interstate. This meant that to continue their season, much of the WA team had to relocate to Melbourne for somewhere between two weeks and a month. While many of us were expecting to remain in Melbourne for more time, our stay ended after only one week – leaving Daniel "DJ" Johanson mad about the fact that he did not get to play as much golf as he wanted to and the Monday wine club had to be cancelled after a successful introduction.



The move back to Perth was a welcome return to reality and footy was pretty normal. The crowds were back, and it did not stop raining for what felt like weeks. Jeff Dalglish and DJ umpired in two states in 24 hours, while Adam Bastick couldn't stay standing. Jordan Fry also made his AFL debut in the Round 11 game between West Coast and Essendon, which was a fantastic achievement. But it was only another month and a half before Perth was thrown back into a four-day

lockdown, resulting in footy being moved over east again and a smaller cohort of the WA team chasing the opportunity to live out of a suitcase.

Once again, the stay for the WA group in Melbourne was short-lived, the Perth lockdown ended, crowd restrictions were lifted and DJ's golf plans were again scuppered. Then the nation watched as the COVID problem in Sydney became more dire and teams were moved to Melbourne, the WA hard border returned, quarantine matches began, all before Melbourne's COVID situation deteriorated.

The question was asked – who could host the AFL Grand Final? To which Mark McGowan simply showed the AFL a picture of a full Optus Stadium and a Cottesloe sunset, and history was created with the first season decider bound for Perth.

The remainder of the season was relatively normal, although Round 22 saw the ending of the careers of two respected WA AFL umpires. The retirement of Dean Margetts was the end of an era that saw him umpire 377 AFL games among his 487 senior games, with his contribution to WA umpiring set to continue long into the future.

Adam Bastick's AFL career ended for the second time as he "slipped" into retirement after 148 AFL matches, including one AFL finals game, for a career total of 274 senior games.



Round 22 also saw the retirement of some of the most important members of the WA AFL umpiring team – our medical trainers Tayla Lewis, Jen Gresham, Jess Gregor and Zoe O'Mara. As a group, we all thank you for your help over the years and for keeping us on the track as much as possible. We also thank Daniel Martin for holding down the fort and making sure we have someone looking after us in 2022.



Finals footy saw those given the opportunity to live out of suitcases again as the WA border remained steely shut to the east coast. Nathan Doig and Brett Dalglish represented those based in WA, leaving the safety of the Perth bubble to umpire in Brisbane and Adelaide, while Brett Rosebury and Nathan Williamson represented the ex-pat community.



We were lucky enough to welcome Brett Rosebury home to umpire an incredible ninth AFL Grand Final in front of a huge WA crowd at Optus Stadium as Melbourne lifted the premiership cup for the first time since 1964.

Like every season, it would be remiss of me not to thank the amazing people who are in the background. Our WA coaches Geoff O'Neill and John Marrapodi who always want to push us to succeed and do our very best week in, week out. And like every season, I must thank the whole WA team, and welcome Jordan Russell to the WA AFL team for 2022.

2020 was a ride, but 2021 is a season that will be remembered, too. Hopefully 2022 sees a return to complete normality, but we will have to wait until then to find out.

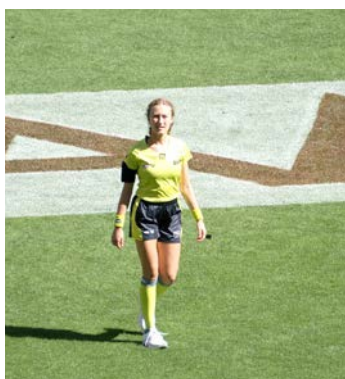

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING REPORT

After a rollercoaster 2020, the expectation was that 2021 would be the beginning of a return to normality. The return of Mackenzie Liddelow for his second year as the Assistant Strength & Conditioning coach helped with this. Mack's calm demeanor and attention to detail makes him a strong asset to the umpiring group and, ultimately, to the onfield performance of our umpires. We also welcomed some new university practicum students – Ellie Wilcox, Liam Brockwell and Corey Wilson – to the team.

As with the previous year, we started in a familiar fashion with the time trial at McGillivray Oval. The results were the best we have ever had on average, which cannot be understated with all of the obstacles from the previous year. McGillivray Oval provided us with fabulous conditions for running and a memorable event to build our year on.

Following the time trial, we returned to training at Ernest Johnson Reserve which was done within umpiring disciplines. Field umpires trained on Tuesday, while Goal and Boundary umpires trained on Thursday. This approach was brought on in the shadow of COVID-19 to reduce infection risk, but it allowed each umpire to train with less disruption on their allocated training night. The downside was that the pressure would be on the umpire to train effectively in isolation 50% of the time.



As with 2020, I was delighted at the mental resilience our umpires showed as a lower training attendance seemed to have very little effect on match-day performance. Our umpires backed up week after week. This was despite many umpires having to perform in multiple games across a weekend on several occasions due to low umpiring numbers. The low injury rate across this period of the season is a testament to the physical preparation and attention to detail shown by the group.

I would like to thank both Professor Karen Wallman (University of Western Australia) and Zane McDonald (Edith Cowan University) for their continued involvement in our environment. Having a few extra bodies makes a massive difference in the quality of training delivery when you are organizing what is basically a sporting event for over 100 people multiple times per week.

I would also like to thank my fellow coaches Greg, Cam and Ryan as well as Dean and David for their continued support. Finally, I would like to wish the trainers Tayla, Jen, Zoe and Jess well in their future endeavors. We will miss you.

I look forward to what should be a fantastic season in 2022.

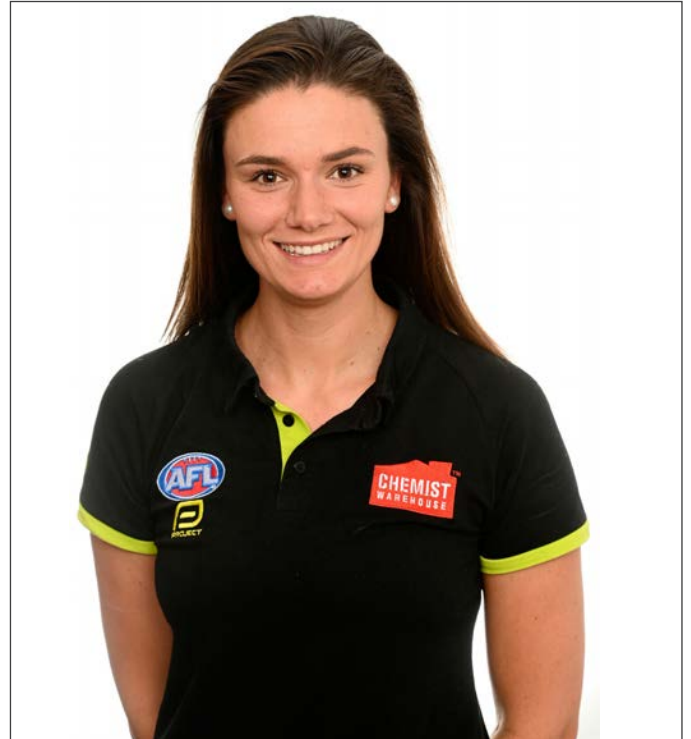
2021 was another eventful and unpredictable year.

HALL OF FAME

Michael Washbourne

The prestigious WANFLUA Hall of Fame returned in 2021 for the induction of another three greats of the West Australian umpiring fraternity.

Held once again inside the Brett Rosebury Room following the success of the last event in 2019, the WANFLUA Hall of Fame induction remains the flagship function on the Association's annual social calendar. The room was lined with the caricatures of the past inductees and spatially decorated to cater for more than 130 guests, including several former umpires and their families.



SportFM Breakfast host and WAFL match commentator Jacob Landsmeer responded to a last-minute SOS to MC the evening's proceedings and proved to be an instant hit as all of the attending Hall of Fame members were welcomed to the front of the stage.

2021 inductees - Scott McPhee (field), Graeme "Tig" Bergersen (boundary) and Dale Edwick (goal) - were then presented to the audience, first with a video tribute and then a Q&A about their stellar careers.

Bergersen described his induction as the absolute pinnacle of his time in umpiring, having decided many decades ago to trade his footy boots for a very memorable stint running the boundary. The popular umpire, who once delayed the restart of a televised WAFL match because he was giving a half-time interview, was one of the first WANFLUA members to officiate in an AFL/VFL game in WA.



McPhee was a regular fixture at WAFL matches during the late 2000s and early 2010s across a career which culminated in 205 senior matches, including a remarkable five League grand finals in a row from 2011 to 2015. Affectionately known as Rowdy, he twice took home the Montgomery Medal as the WAFL's leading field umpire of the year and featured in two State Games before calling time on his brilliant career just before the start of the 2016 season.

Edwick arrived at WAFL ranks in 1996 as a fresh-faced field umpire but managed only one season before switching to the goals. From there, he never looked back and became one of the WANFLUA's finest flagwavers. He was added to the AFL panel in 2006, the same year he won the Carter Medal, and chalked up 123 games on football's biggest stage for an overall career tally of 288.

To be eligible for the Hall of Fame, umpires must have been retired for a minimum of three years, officiated in at least one League Grand Final, umpired at least 100 games after 1976 (prior to 1976 no game limit) and have demonstrated outstanding achievements during their career.

The WANFLUA would like to extend a special thanks to Kendell "KB" Lamplugh for her tireless efforts making this function possible, in particular her work to bring a number of past and life members to the event.

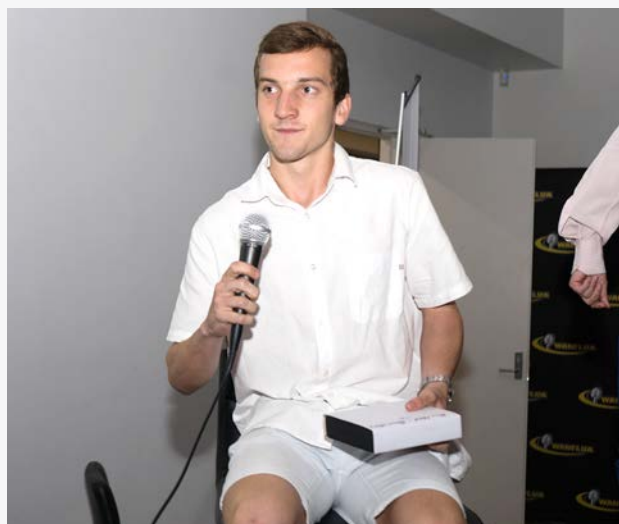
Ross Capes Medal – Alex Crowhurst

TALENT ACADEMY AWARDS

Mike Ball Field Talent Award – Josh Antulov

2021 was an outstanding year for Josh, a polite young man who listens to feedback and applies it to improve his umpiring. Josh reaped the rewards of a strong pre-season and was selected in Reserves where his consistency and confidence grew. He worked hard on his skills, man-management and communication. MOST IMPROVED MEDALLISTS

Brett Rosebury Medal – Curtis Snadden

Curtis was given a challenge at the end of 2019 – he didn't have to work harder or get fitter, he had to be better in the areas we can't practice such as having a stronger on-field presence and being a manager of men. In 2020, instead of looking around at everyone else, he worked on himself. In 2021, he took this to another level and has now umpired two full seasons at League level with the consistency the field coaching team have been looking for.



Greg Smith Medal – Jaco Jansen van Rensburg

Jaco was elevated to the WAFL Talent Academy in 2019 after beginning his boundary umpiring journey at Senior Community level. He possesses tremendous running ability with exceptional pace and has now successfully combined those natural skills with his boundary umpiring potential. Jaco umpired the majority of the season in League football after making his debut in Round 1 and is well set for an even more competitive year in 2022, having also been contracted to the AFLW Boundary team.



David Shawcross Medal – Matt Devenish

Building on the very impressive pre-season form which initially delivered him the Merv Rose Medal, Matt was rewarded for his consistent performances in the Reserves during the first half of the season with a League debut in Round 16. Despite his quiet demeanour, the Bunbury product has established himself as a leader among the young goal umpiring group and he finished the year waving the flags in the Colts Grand Final.



UMPIRE OF THE YEAR MEDALLISTS

Ray Montgomery Medal – Trent McPhee

Trent rediscovered his true self in 2021 – he was fitter, more focused on his role and enjoying his umpiring a lot more. He has always shown he is capable but these qualities were not always seen every week. This season Trent performed at his best on a very consistent basis. Even after a small injury setback, he immediately returned to the high standard he had set himself throughout the year.



John Devine Medal – Jordan Russell

Jordan is a model of consistency who has had a profound impact on WAFL Boundary Umpiring in a relatively short period of time. He possesses the talent and skills but above all its his work rate and thirst for feedback and continual improvement which continues to impress. He is also very balanced in his attitude and displays a level of maturity that belies his age. Jordan has now been appointed to four successful League grand finals in only 65 games and will put his craft to the ultimate test on the AFL stage in 2022.



Bill Carter Medal – Jason Yazdani

In 2016, in only his second season, Jason was appointed to his first WAFL league game, umpired at the National 16s competition, was awarded the Rising Star and officiated in the Colts Grand Final. After umpiring his first WAFL League Grand Final in 2020, Jason was again appointed to the 2021 WAFL League Grand Final but made the unselfish decision on the eve of the final to withdraw because of illness. This was a tough decision but one that justified why he was worthy of being awarded the Bill Carter Medal.



HIGH HONOUR AWARDS

Rising Star – Ben Robinson

Ben's story is a unique one, with field umpire Jack McCarthy suggesting to his East Fremantle umpiring mate that he should give boundary umpiring at WAFL a crack. Clearly this a marvellous suggestion as Ben excelled in his first year in WAFL ranks.

Ben is an excellent athlete and instantaneously demonstrated he has both the stamina and speed to compete at WAFL level. Perhaps most significantly, Ben wants to learn and grow as a person and an umpire. He grasped the key concepts of boundary umpiring very quickly and it wasn't long before he found himself in Reserves football performing consistently week in and week out. Ben has tremendous potential and has been elevated to the High Performance Team for 2022.



John McKay Life Members Trophy – Kendell Lamplugh

Known affectionately as KB to many, Kendell has assisted the WANFLUA in organising and conducting the last two Hall of Fame functions at the new EJ, both of which have been a great success due to the amazing input and work she has done with Lachlan Fahey-Gilmour and the social committee. Along with this work, KB has for the last few years also taken it upon herself to manage the Life and Past Members of the WANFLUA, including organising the Life Members functions to retain engagement with the group. This has been integral in the attendance of many Life Members and Past Members at our functions. KB has always had a vested interest in the social culture of the group, more recently with her yearly KB'NARA pasta night for the goal umpires, and has also taken on roles working with our female umpires and the State Umpiring Advisory Group (SUAG). She becomes the first two-time winner of the John McKay Life Members Trophy which illustrates her unprecedented level of commitment to our group and improving it.

VALE MAX HALE

Maxwell James Hale was a well respected member of the WANFLUA as a goal umpire. He was always immaculate in his appearance, meticulous in his preparation of games, efficient in performance and attention to detail.

He was a great mentor to new and up and coming goal umpires with lots of encouragement and, if required, the occasional spray if one needed to improve. I know personally as I have been on the end of a few.

Max commenced with the WANFLUA in 1968 and made his League debut the following year. When he retired in 1985, his 274 League games was a WAFL record.

He was inducted into WAFL 200 club in 1981 and waved the flags in the 1972, 1980 and 1983 WAFL grand finals. He was appointed to one other but had to withdraw due to illness. He was also named in the WANFLUA Team of the Decade 1973-1982.

In 1982 he was made a Life Member of WANFLUA. He served as Vice President of the Association in 1984 after many years on the Committee. In 1995 he was one of the inaugural inductee to the WANFLUA Hall of Fame.

Max was especially known for being very welcoming to new umpires attending training for the first time. He was usually the first to approach them with a



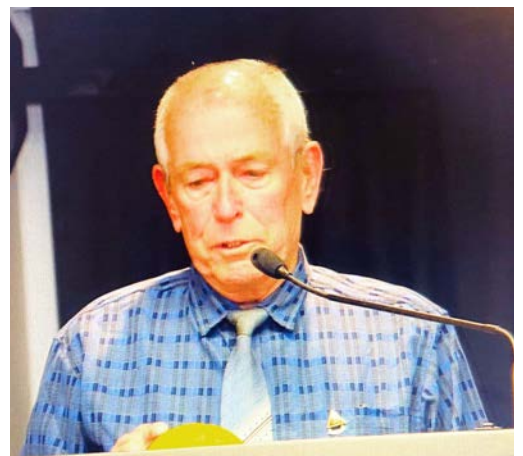
word of encouragement. I remember my first training session, having arrived from Hobart and not knowing a soul in WA. He made me very welcome and we became lifelong friends.

Max was a very sociable guy with his lovely wife Fran.

Together they attended all social events run by the WANFLUA and there were many in those days, including a number of end of season trips to South East Asia.

It has been very sad for us to witness the decline in Max's health during latter years and will miss him greatly.

Willing to share a tip, welcoming of new recruits, oozing integrity and respectful of those who came before him. More importantly, respectful of the game and the players.

"Bally" had an air of confidence. He knew exactly what he was doing and he was doing what he loved. Football was Mike's life.

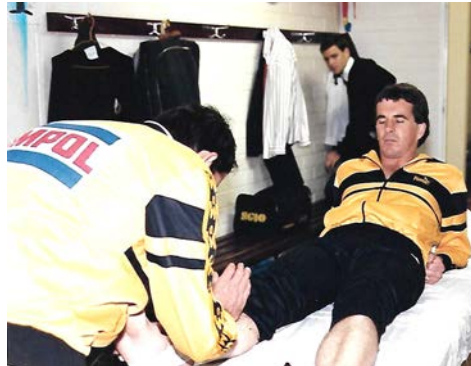
He bounced better than most. He positioned himself so infringements were obvious. His knowledge of the Laws of Football was second to none. There was never a negative word said about Bally.

Mike had immense empathy or consideration of others. The following is just one example.

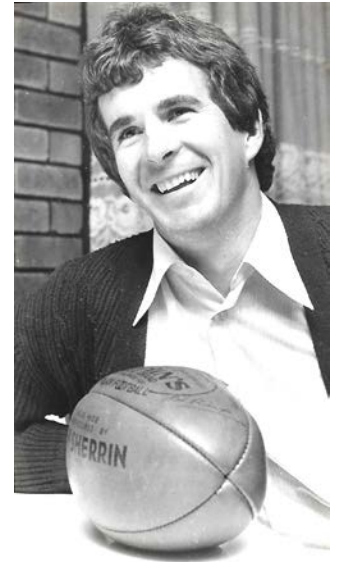
The scene, his 300th senior match at Bassendean Oval in 1992. I was fortunate to share the milestone with him and we spoke of the late Ray Montgomery's games record of 308. It was obvious that Mike would break this in the following year.

Michael whispered to me just prior to the match: "I don't think I will mate, Monty's record should stand for all time. You know they were all under the one umpire system. It just wouldn't be right."

Here he was, about to be the



games record holder for the WAFL umpires, and yet humble to suggest that there were others more worthy.



A few years later, whilst in my role as the State Director of Umpiring, I lobbied the WAFC to formalise our annual Umpire of the Year Award, being named the "Montgomery Medal" and to be awarded on the football industry's most prestigious night, the Sandover Medal.

This is a legacy that will remain, it recognises Ray Montgomery's feats in a golden era of WA football, and it epitomises the values held by Michael Ball. Values shared by your Association.



For the record, Mike umpired in 301 senior matches – 248 WAFL, 45 VFL/AFL, 6 State Games and 2 SANFL matches. He officiated in 4 WAFL Grand Finals, was President of the Association, an esteemed Life Member and was inducted into the Umpires Hall of Fame in 1996.

To cap it all, Bally was inducted into the WAFC Hall of Fame in 2017.

Our lives are so much more enriched for having known Michael D Ball, or as we all knew him...Bally.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2021

1 Statement of significant accounting policies

The significant policies which have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report are:

Basis of accounting

The financial report is a special purpose financial report that has been prepared for its members in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Interpretations, other authoritative announcements and the Association Handbook in a form appropriate for a sporting association.

It has been prepared on the basis of historical costs and except where stated, does not take into account changing money values or fair values of non-current assets.

The accounting policies have been consistently applied, and, except where there is a change in accounting policy, are consistent with those of the previous year.

Statement of compliance

The financial report complies with Australian Accounting Standards, which include Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (AIFRS). Compliance with AIFRS ensures that the financial report, comprising the financial statements and notes thereto, complies with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS).

(a) Revenue recognition

Revenues are recognised at fair value of the consideration received.

Membership – Membership revenue is driven through subscription fees. All membership income is recognised in the financial year in which it has been received to accurately match membership revenue with events held.

Interest – Interest income is recognised when it is credited.

(b) Receivables

Subscriptions shall be payable in the case of an Active Member immediately on notification of appointment as an Umpire and in all other cases no later than the 31st of May each year.

Collectability of debtors is reviewed on an ongoing basis. A provision for doubtful debts is raised where doubt as to the collection exists and debts which are known to be uncollectible are written off.

(c) Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Acquisition – All acquisitions of assets (except caricatures but including the updating on all honour boards, photos and framing of posters) are recorded at the cost of acquisition, being the purchase consideration determined as at the date of acquisition, plus costs incidental to acquisition.

Caricatures – They are anticipated to have indeterminate useful life. Their service potential has not, in any material sense, been consumed during the reporting period and as such, no amount for depreciation is recognised.

Depreciation – From 1 January 2016 purchases <\$2,000 to be depreciated at a rate of 100%. Purchases of a large amount will be depreciated on a case by case basis based on the assets expected useful life.

Assets purchased in 2019 financial year with a value of >\$2,000 have been depreciated on the straight-line method with a useful life of five (5) years.

(d) Cash assets

Cash assets are carried at face value of the amounts deposited.

(e) Inventories

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Net realisable value is determined on the basis of each inventory line's estimated selling price.

(f) Payables

Trade creditors represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Association prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

(g) Taxes

The Association is exempt from the payment of income tax under the Income Tax Assessment Act.

Goods and services tax (GST) - Revenue, expenses, assets and liabilities are recognised inclusive of the amount of GST.


